HIS Day His Majesty came to the House of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, feated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Mr.-Quarme, Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, was fent with a Message from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers. The Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleafed to give the Royal Affent to

An A. I for granting an Aid to His Majefty, by a Land Tax to be raifed in Great Britain, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-one.

An Act for continuing and granting to His Majesty certain Duties upon Malt, Mum, Cyd.r, and Perry, for the Service of the Year One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-one.

An Act for granting to His Majesty additional Duties upon Malt:

An Ast for granting to His Majesty additional Du-ties upon Worts, Wash, and other Liquors browed or made in England for extracting Spirits for Home Con-sumption; upon Spirits made in Scotland and imported into England, and upon Foreign Spirits imported into into England, and upon Foreign spirits imported into Great Britain; and to continue certain Acts for difcontinuing, for a limited Time, the feweral Duties

An Act for granting to His Majesty additional Duties on the Amount of the Duties, under the Manage-ment of the Commissioners for the Assairs of Taxes, therein mentioned.
