To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Merchants, Heritors, and Adventurers in the British Fisheries, residing in the Royal Borough of Rothefay, specially assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

ANIMATED by the most lively Sensations of Gratitude for the many Blessings we enjoy under your Majesty's mild and just Government, we the Merchants, Heritors and Adventurers in the British Fisheries, residing in your Majesty's Royal Borough of Rothefay, humbly solicit Permission to approach your Majesty's Throne, offering our cordial Congratulations on the happy Event of the Differences, which lately subsisted between your Majesty and the Court of Spain, being adjusted; and that, while Negotiations were depending, the Honour and Dignity of your Majesty's Crown, as well as the Interest of your People, were ably supported.

We justly attribute the Continuation of Peace to the wise and vigorous Measures adopted by your Majesty, which, aided by prudent and faithful Ministers, and supported by a free and independent

People, struck our Enemies with awful Astonishment, when, instantaneously, your Majesty was enabled to assert the Rights and Privileges of Britain by the Equipment of a most formidable Fleet, commanded by Officers of distinguished Courage and Abilities, and manned with British Volunteers.

Thus it is evident, by your Majesty's wise Administration, that while we enjoy the Blessings of Peace, with the Extension and Protection of our Commerce, Means are preparing for the Defence of your Majesty's Dominions, and a benevolent Regard shown for the Lives and Property of your Subjects, by the judicious Application of your Majesty's Royal Bounty, for promoting of the British Fisheries; a Source of Wealth and Strength to these Kingdoms, from whence, on all Emergencies, your Majesty's Navy can have a Supply of hardy Seamen.

That your Majesty may long live in uninterrupted Felicity to reign over a happy People, and that your Majesty's Arms may ever prove victorious, is our most ardent Wish.
