AT the Court at St. James's, the 5th of January, 1791,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by virtue of an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to continue for a limited Time certain Provisions contained in an Act made in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution certain Orders of Council respecting the Importation and Exportation of Corn and Grain, and also certain Orders issued by the Governor-General of His Majesty's Colonies in America, and for preventing Suits in consequence of the same; and for making further Provisions relative thereto, relating to the Importation of Corn and Grain; and to authorize His Majesty to permit the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Meal or Flour, and to prohibit the Importation thereof on the low Duties," His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 13th of October last, among other Things, to direct, that if it should appear at any Time before the 28th Day of February, 1791, by the Average Price of British Rye, as the same should be published in the London Gazette by the Receiver of Corn Returns, from the Returns received by him, that the Average Price of such Rye should be

under Thirty-two Shillings per Quarter, it should not be lawful to import into any Port of this Kingdom, at the End of Six Days after such Publication in the London Gazette, any Foreign Rye or Rye-Meal at the low Duties: And whereas by virtue of the said Order Rye is not now permitted to be imported into this Kingdom on the low Duties, as the Price thereof, on the Average of the Week ending November the 13th, 1790, had fallen under Thirty-two Shillings per Quarter: And whereas it appears that the Price of Rye has since considerably risen, in those Counties where this Sort of Corn is principally consumed by the Inhabitants thereof, and it is on that Account become expedient to allow the same to be imported on the low Duties; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by virtue of the Powers vested in Him by the before-mentioned Act, hereby revoke so much of the said Order of the 13th of October last as relates to the Importation of Foreign Rye or Rye-Meal at the low Duties: And His Majesty's doth hereby order, with the Advice aforesaid, that it shall be lawful to import into any Port of this Kingdom any Foreign Rye or Rye-Meal at the low Duties, any Thing in the said Order of the 13th of October last contained to the contrary notwithstanding: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Assembly of Jamaica, beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that we consider it as a particular Instance of your Majesty's great Attention to the Welfare of this Island, that you have been graciously pleased to appoint a Governor, whose Capacity, Probity and Moderation give us the highest Expectations that his Excellency will, in every Circumstance, support the Honor of the Crown, and the just Rights and Liberties of your Majesty's faithful Subjects in Jamaica.

We gratefully acknowledge your Majesty's Wisdom, in directing that every Exertion should be continued in order to enforce the Negotiation that has been entered into for Peace: Animated no less by our Attachment to the essential Welfare of this Island, than by our Zeal for the Support of your Majesty's Government, we will most cheerfully make such a Provision for the Exigencies of the Public Service as may be suitable to our present Circumstances.

We earnestly beseech the Divine Goodness long to continue the Blessings of your Majesty's Reign over a happy, a loyal and united People.

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Bailiffs and Burgeses of the Borough of Leicester, in Common Hall assembled,

humbly beg Leave to lay before your Majesty our sincere Congratulations on the happy Termination of the late threatened Hostilities with Spain.
