The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS by virtue of an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, " An Act to continue for a limited Time certain Provisions contained in an Act made in this refent Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for " indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution certain Orders of Council respecting the Importation and Exportation of Corn and Grain, and also certain Orders Mued by the Governor-Ge-. " neral of His Majesty's Colonies in America, - and for preventing Suits in consequence of the " fame; and for making further Provisions relative thereto, relating to the Importation of Corn and Grain; and to authorize His Majesty to permit the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Meal or Flour, . " and to prohibit the Importation thereof on the low Duties," His Majesty was pleased, by His Order In Council of the 13th of October last, among other Things, to direct, that if it should appear at any Time before the 28th Day of February, 1791, by the Average Price of British Rye, as the same should be published in the London Gazette by the Receiver of Corn Returns, from the Returns received by him, that the Average Price of such Rye should be

A T the Court at St. James's, the 5th of January, | under Thirty-two Shillings per Quarter, it should not be lawful to import into any Port of this Kingdom, at the End of Six Days after such Publication in the London Gazette, any Foreign Rye or Rye-Meal at the low Duties: And whereas by virtue of the said. Order Rye is not now permitted to be imported into this Kingdom on the low Duties, as the Price thereof, on the Average of the Week ending November the 13th, 1790, had fallen under Thirtytwo Shillings per Quarter: And whereas it appears that the Price of Rye has fince confiderably rifen, in those Counties where this Sort of Corn is principally confumed by the Inhahitants thereof, and it is on that Account become expedient to allow the same to be imported on the low Duties; His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by virtue of the Powers wested in Him by the before-mentioned Act, hereby revoke fo much of the faid Order of the 13th of October last as relates to the Importation of Foreign Rye or Rye-Meal at the low Duties: And His Majesty's doth hereby order, with the Advice aforefaild, that it shall be lawful to import into any Port of this Kingdom any Foreign Rye or Rye-Meal at the low Duties, any Thing in the faid Order of the 13th of October last contained to the contrary notwithstanding: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directtions herein accordingly. HIS Day the Parliament having met, according to Prorogation, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the usual Sodemnity, the Honourable Henry Fane, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Excellency to the House of Commons, signifying his Pleasure that they should immediately attend his Excellency in the House of Peers: The Commons being come thither accordingly, his Excellency made the following Speech:

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

I Have fincere Pleasure in acquainting you, by the King's Command, that the Differences which had arisen between His Majesty and the Court of Spain have happily been brought to an amicable Termination. Copies of the Declarations exchanged between His Majesty's Ambassa or and the Minister of the Catholic King, and of the Convention which has been fince concluded, will be laid before you. Had the Honor of His Majesty's Crown, and the

Had the Honor of His Majefty's Crown, and the Protection of the Rights a d Interests of the Empire, involved His Kingdoms in the Calamities of War, the Zeal manifested by all His Subjects, and by none more than His loyal People of Ireland, had left Him no Doubt of the most vigorous and effectual Support. It is a Source of peculiar Satisfaction to His Majesty, that those Objects have been accomplished without any actual Interruption of the Blessings of Peace.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

I have ordered the proper Officers to lay the National Accounts before you, fully relying upon your accustomed Zeal to provide for the Exigencies of the State, and the honorable Support of His Majesty's Government.

I have also ordered an Account of the Extraordinary Expences of Government, which have been incurred during the Negotiation with Spain, to be laid before you; and I trust you will find that the Confidence you reposed in me has not been misplaced.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

Your Disposition to facilitate the Businels of Commerce, and to consult the Ease of the Merchants, will induce you to consider, and, if possible, to accomplish during this Session, such Regulations as may tend to simplify the Collection of the various Articles of the Public Revenue.

Your unremitted Care of the Agriculture, Trade, and Manufactures of this Kingdom, and particularly the Linen Manufacture, and your accustomed Liberality to the Protestant Charter-Schools, and other public Institutions for charitable Purposes, make it unnecessary for me to direct your Attention to those Objects individually.

A more intimate Acquaintance with this Country has increased my Wishes for it's Welfare; and I have observed, with the sincerest Satisfaction, the Extension of her Agriculture, her rising Trade and improving Manufactures. You may be assured of my Co-operation in every Measure that may conduce to those important Purposes; and, whilst I thus fulfil His Majesty's Commands, I shall attain the highest Object of my Ambition if I can be instrumental in contributing to the Prosperity and Happiness of Ireland.
