That in consequence thereof the Counsel for the Petitioners Sir John Honeywood and John Curtis, Esquire, delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Counsel for the Petitioners state the Right of Election to be in the Inhabitants of ancient Houses and Houses built on the Sites of ancient Houses within the Borough of Steyning, being Householders paying Scot and Lot, and not receiving Alms."—That the Counsel for the Sitting Members James Martin Lloyd and Henry Howard, Esquires, delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Counsel for the Sitting Members state the Right of Election to be in the Constable and Householders, Inhabitants within the Borough of Steyning, paying Scot and Lot, and not receiving Alms."—That upon the Statement delivered in by the Counsel for the said Sitting Members, the said Select Committee have determined, "That the Right of Election, as set forth in the said Statement, is not the Right of Election for the Borough of Steyning in the County of Sussex." That upon the Statement delivered in by the Counsel for the Petitioners the said Committee have determined, "That the Right of Election, as set forth in the said Statement, is the Right of Election for the Borough of Steyning." I do hereby give this Notice, in pursuance of the Directions of the Act made in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intitled, "An Act for the further Regulation of the Trials of Controverted Elections, or Returns of Members to serve in Parliament." That in consequence thereof the Counsel for the Petitioners, Lord Shuldarn and Sir Ralph Payne, delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Portreeve is the Returning Officer at Elections to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Fowey. The Portreeve for the said Borough is chosen or presented by the Homage at the Court holden for the said Manor of Fowey, usually soon after Michaelmas, by the Steward or the Deputy of the Prince of Wales, Lord of the said Borough and Manor, in Right of His Duchy of Cornwall." That the Counsel for the Petitioners Lord Valletort and Philip Rashleigh, Esquire, and also for the Petitioners John Rashleigh, Richard Hennah, Samuel Nicolls, Nevel Norway and Benjamin Bloomfield, of the Borough of Fowey in the County of Cornwall, on Behalf of themselves and others who were at the last Election, lawful Electors for the said Borough, delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Persons entitled to elect the Portreeve of the Borough of Fowey are those who are capable of Holding that Office; that is, such Prince's Tenants only as have been duly admitted on the Court Rolls of the Manor of the said Borough, and have done their Fealty, and such Persons only are duly admitted whose Lands were anciently and continue to be held immediately of the Duke of Cornwall, as Parcel of his said Manor of the said Borough, and whose Titles to those Lands have been presented at a Court Baron, by a Sworn Homage or Jury of the Freeholders of the said Borough." That the said Select Committee, having duly considered the said Statements, and the Evidence adduced before them touching the Right of choosing, nominating or appointing the Returning Officer for the said Borough, have determined, "That the Portreeve of the Borough of Fowey is the Returning Officer for the said Borough, and that it is necessary that such Returning Officer should be chosen or presented by a Homage or Jury of Prince's Tenants, duly admitted on the Court Rolls of the Manor of the said Borough, and that Prince's Tenants admitted by the Steward or Deputy Steward, at a Court holden in the said Manors, are duly admitted, and that the Presentation of the Homage is not necessary to such Admission." That the said Select Committee had also determined, "That Thomas Min was the proper Returning Officer at the late Election for Burgesses to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Fowey." Clk of the General Meetings.

Whereas it has been represented to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that on the 10th of December last, as James Cammell, Second Mate of the Ratey Revenue Cutter was cruising between Christ Church and Harst, in a Boat belonging to the said Cutter, he fell in with a large Smuggling Luggar near Becken B. y. and which was then landing her Cargo: That on his being discovered by the Crew of the said Luggar, they ordered him to come on Board, which the Officer refused, and immediately the Luggar got under Sail, chased the Custom-House Boat, and feloniously fired several Shot at her: That the following Night about Eight o'Clock, a Boat belonging to the Swan Revenue Cutter, in the Service of the Customs, commanded by Joseph Goodridge, an Officer of this Revenue, fell in with the said Luggar near Christ Church, which he immediately chased, and came up with, when the Crew of the Luggar ordered the Officer and his Men on Board, whom they forced below, and kept a Guard over them, whilst the Luggar proceeded to the Westward, and at Two o'Clock next Morning landed her Goods at Burn Bottom, consisting of about 1000 Casks of Foreign Spirituous Liquors, some Tea and Tobacco. They then ordered the Officer and his Boat's Crew into their Boat, and dismissed them, after having plundered the Boat of Fire Arms and some of her Materials.

The above Luggar is about 150 Tons Burthen, mounting Fourteen or Sixteen Guns, Nine and Eighteen Pounders, and is commanded by a Man about Thirty Years of Age, and full Six Feet high. The Crew in general were supposed to be Irish, and between 60 and 70 in Number. One of the Crew, a Man belonging to Hastings, in the County of Kent, is well known to the Officers.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in this Felony and Piracy, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of the said Offenders (except the Commander of the said Luggar) who shall discover his Accomplices, so that Two or more of them may be apprehended and convicted of either of the said Offences.
