P R E S E N T,
The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS there was this Day read at the Board, the humble Petition of several Merchants of London, in Behalf of themselves and others trading to Spain, humbly praying, for the Reasons therein contained, that all Ships coming from the Ports of Spain within the Mediterranean, laden with Fruit, Wine, and other Goods not enumerated in the Quarantine Regulations, may, on the same being verified to the Officers to the Customs at the Ports where such Ships may arrive, be freely admitted to Entry without performing Quarantine; His Majesty, having taken the said Petition into Consideration, and being desirous to remove all Obstructions upon Trade, so far as may be consistent with the Health and Safety of His Subjects, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the Quarantine at present subsisting upon all Ships and Vessels coming from or through the Mediterranean, be taken off, so far as respects Ships and Vessels coming directly from any of the Ports of the Kingdom of Spain, within the Mediterranean, or from the Island of Minorca, laden with the Products of

Spain only; and that all such Ships, and also all Ships and Vessels arriving from the Town or Port of Gibraltar, be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings without unpacking, opening and airing, and without performing any Quarantine: Provided that the Cargo on board such Ships shall consist entirely of Articles not enumerated in the Orders of Council directing the Performance of Quarantine, except any Bags, Straw, Matting or Plating on Jars, which shall have been solely made use of as Package for the said non-enumerated Articles: And provided also that they bring with them clean Bills of Health, and that the Master or Person taking Charge of such Ship or Vessel do first make Answer, upon Oath, before the Superintendent of Quarantine, or other Person appointed for that Service, to the printed Questions usually put to the Masters of Ships coming from Places from whence Quarantine is required to be performed; and that by the said Answers, which shall be transmitted by the said Superintendent or other Person appointed to see Quarantine performed, to the Principal Officers of the Customs, or to the Chief Magistrate at the Place to which the Ship is bound, it shall appear, to the Satisfaction of the said Principal Officers or Chief Magistrate, that such Ship did not touch at any infected Place, nor had Communication with any infected Ship or Vessel, during the

the Voyage, and that the Crew is free from Infection. — And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master General of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The Weather having continued unseasonably mild and wet during the greatest Part of the Winter, we are alarmed with frequent Accidents of the Plague in different Quarters of this Residence. Amongst other Sufferers, the Captain of a French Ship, and one of his Seamen, were carried off by the contagious Malady a few Days ago.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that on Sunday the 20th of February last, about Three o'Clock in the Morning, a Gun, loaded with Two Bullets, was discharged at the Bedchamber Window of Mrs. Jones, Wife of Thomas Jones, of Fritton Hall, in the Parish of Fritton, in the County of Suffolk, Esq; by some evil-disposed Person unknown; fortunately, however, one of the Bullets lodged in the Window Shutter, and the other, although it passed through the Shutter, was stopped by the Window Curtain, and fell upon the Ground; and that it appears, from several Circumstances, that the said Gun was discharged at the said Window, with the felonious Intent of murdering the said Mrs. Jones, who was, at that Time, in Bed in the said Chamber, in the Absence of her Husband.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in firing the Gun as abovementioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually fired the said Gun as aforesaid) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that, in the Night of Tuesday the 4th of January last, the Ship Increase, Francis Parson, Master, in the Service of the Office of Ordnance, was driven by a Storm into St. Bride's Bay, in the County of Pembroke, and was stranded on Druidston Sands, within the said Bay; and that a great Number of Persons riotously assembled on Board the said Ship, and feloniously plundered her of various Ordnance Stores and other Things, amongst whom was John Walters, of the Parish of Walton West, in the said County, Miller, who was particularly active on this Occasion.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the said John Walters, is hereby pleased to offer His most gracious Pardon to any one of the Persons concerned in plundering the said Ship, not in actual Custody, who shall discover the said John Walters, so that he may be apprehended and convicted.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that on the 10th of December last, as James Cammell, Second Mate of the

the Rose Revenue Cutter was cruising between Christ Church and Hurst, in a Boat belonging to the said Cutter, he fell in with a large Smuggling Luger near Becken Bury, and which was then landing her Cargo: That on his being discovered by the Crew of the said Luger, they ordered him to come on Board, which the Officer refused, and immediately the Luger got under Sail, chased the Custom-House Boat, and feloniously fired several Shot at her: That the following Night about Eight o'Clock, a Boat belonging to the Swan Revenue Cutter, in the Service of the Customs, commanded by Joseph Goodridge, an Officer of this Revenue, fell in with the said Luger near Christ Church, which he immediately chased, and came up with, when the Crew of the Luger ordered the Officer and his Men on Board, whom they forced below, and kept a Guard over them, whilst the Luger proceeded to the Westward, and at Two o'Clock next Morning landed her Goods at Bourn Bottom, consisting of above 1000 Cases of Foreign Spirituous Liguors, some Tea and Tobacco. They then ordered the Officer and his Boat's Crew into their Boat, and dismissed them, after having plundered the Boat of Fire Arms and some of her Materials.

The above Luger is about 160 Tons Burthen, mounting Fourteen or Sixteen Guns, Nine and Eighteen Pounders, and is commanded by a Man about Thirty Years of Age, and full Six Feet high. The Crew in general were supposed to be Irish, and between 60 and 70 in Number. One of the Crew, a Man belonging to Hastings, in the County of Kent, is well known to the Officers.

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in this Felony and Piracy, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of the said Offenders (except the Commander of the said Luger) who shall discover his Accomplices, so that Two or more of them may be apprehended and convicted of either of the said Offences.
