A PROCLAMATION,

For Encouraging Seamen and Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War.

GEORGE R.

WHĒREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen and Landmen who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service ; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation : And We do hereby promise and declare, That all such Able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Thirty-first Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or Officers employed in Tenders, or at Rendezvous on Shore, for Raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Three Pounds each Man ; and all such Ordinary Seamen, of the Ages above mentioned, fit for Our Service, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Two Pounds each Man : And all such Able-Bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man, as Our Royal Bounty ; such respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Checque, residing at the Ports or Places where

the Ships, into which they shall be entered, shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Seamen and Landmen. And We do declare, that the Qualifications of the Seamen and Landmen, so entering themselves as aforesaid, shall be certified by the Captain, Master, and Boatwain of the Ship or Vessel where they shall enter. And, for Prevention of any Abuses, by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty-Money, We do hereby declare and command, that such Seamen and Landmen, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act for the Regulation of His Majesty's Marine Forces while on Shore.

An Act for appointing Commissioners for putting in Execution an Act of this Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for granting an Aid to His Majesty by a Land Tax to be raised in Great Britain, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and ninety-one.

An Act for removing any Doubt respecting the Sale or Mortgage of Annuities, pursuant to an Act made in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An Act to enable the East India Company to raise Money by a Sale of Annuities, and by increasing their Capital Stock.

An Act for altering and amending so much of an Act, passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for removing any Doubt respecting the Power of the Commissioners for the Affairs of India to direct that the Expence of raising, transporting and maintaining such Troops as may be judged necessary for the Security of the British Territories and Possessions in the East Indies, should be defrayed out of the Revenues arising from the said Territories and Possessions, and for limiting the Application of the said Revenues in the Manner therein mentioned, as relates to such Directions as shall be given or approved by the said Commissioners with respect to the Payment of certain Proportions of His Majesty's Forces in India, and of the European Forces of the East India Company therein specified.

An Act to continue the Laws now in Force for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, so far as the same relate to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants of the Countries belonging to the said United States.

An Act to indemnify such Persons as have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments, and to indemnify Justices of the Peace or others who have omitted to register or deliver in their Qualifications within the Time limited by Law, and for giving further Time for those Purposes; and to indemnify Members and Officers in Cities, Corporations and Borough Towns, whose Admissions have been omitted to be stamped according to Law, or, having been stamped, have been lost or mislaid, and for allowing them Time to provide Admissions duly stamped; to give further Time to such Persons as have omitted to make and file Affidavits of the Execution of Indentures of Clerks to Attornies and Solicitors; and for indemnifying Deputy Lieutenants and Officers of the Militia, who have neglected to transmit Descriptions of their Qualifications to the Clerks of the Peace within the Time limited by Law, and for giving further Time for that Purpose.

An Act for amending an Act, made in the Twentieth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for

making and repairing the Road from the City of Glasgow in the County of Lanark to Muirkirk in the County of Ayr, and from thence to the Confines of the said County of Ayr, towards Sanguhar in the County of Dumfries, and other Roads communicating therewith; and for the more effectually repairing the said Roads and the Road from the Village of Gorbals and new Bridge of Glasgow to the Chapel of Cambuslang in the said County of Lanark, and Branches thereof; and for making and repairing the Road from the said Chapel of Cambuslang till it joins the High Road leading from Hamilton, by Burnbank, towards Eaglesham in the County of Renfrew.

An Act to enlarge the Term of an Act, passed in the Tenth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for amending the Road from Wellbourn Mountfort to Stratford upon Avon in the County of Warwick.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of Two Acts, of the Tenth Year of His present Majesty and the last Session of Parliament, for repairing the Road from Biggleswade in the County of Bedford, through Bugden and Alconbury, to the Top of Alconbury Hill, and from Bugden to Huntingdon, and from Cross Hall to Great Stoughton Common in the County of Huntingdon; and also the Road leading out of the aforesaid Road at or near the Ferry House in the Parish of Tempsford to and through Little Barford, Eynesbury, and Saint Neot's, to the Turnpike Road at the End of Cross Hall Lane, and from the Turnpike Road in the Parish of Eaton Soken to the said Turnpike Road near Saint Neot's Bridge.

An Act for continuing the Term and altering and enlarging the Powers of an Act, made in the Tenth Year of His Majesty's Reign, for repairing several Roads in the County of Cardigan, and for repairing other Roads in the said County.

An Act for enlarging the Term and Powers of Two Acts, of the Seventeenth Year of His late Majesty and the Ninth Year of His present Majesty, for repairing and widening the Road leading from a Place called Harlow Bush Common, in the Parish of Harlow in the County of Essex, to Stamp Cross, in the Parish of Great Chesterford, in the said County.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to continue, for a limited Time, certain Provisions contained in an Act made in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution certain Orders of Council respecting the Importation and Exportation of Corn and Grain, and also certain Orders issued by the Governor-General of His Majesty's Colonies in America, and for preventing Suits in consequence of the same, and for making further Provisions relative thereto, relating to the Importation and Exportation of Corn and Grain; and to authorize His Majesty to permit the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Meal or Flour, and to prohibit the Importation thereof on the low Duties,"

“ Duties,” it was enacted, that at any Time before the 28th Day of February, 1791, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, (among other Things) to prohibit, for a limited Time, the Importation on the low Duties of Foreign Wheat, Wheat-Flour, Rye, Rye-Meal, Barley, Barley-Meal, Oats, Oat-Meal, Pease and Beans, and in like Manner to recall such Prohibition; if Circumstances should appear so to require; and all Persons acting contrary to such Prohibition were thereby made liable to the Penalties and Forfeitures therein mentioned.

And whereas by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, “ An Act to continue and amend so much of Two Acts, made in the last Session of Parliament, as relate to the Importation and Exportation of Corn and Grain, and to the authorizing His Majesty to permit the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Meal or Flour, and to prohibit the Importation thereof on the low Duties,” the said beforementioned Act was further continued in Force until the 10th Day of June, 1791.

And whereas, in consequence of Two Orders in Council, the one dated the 13th of October, 1790, and the other dated the 18th of February, 1791, Foreign Wheat and Wheat-Meal are now prohibited to be imported at the low Duties: And whereas it appears that the Price of Wheat, since the issuing of the said Orders, is considerably risen, and it is on that Account become expedient to allow the same to be imported on the low Duties; His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by virtue of the Powers vested in Him by the before-mentioned Acts, hereby revoke so much of the said before-mentioned Orders as relate to the Importation of Foreign Wheat and Wheat-Meal at the low Duties: And His Majesty doth hereby order, by and with the Advice aforesaid, that until the 10th Day of June next ensuing, it shall be lawful to import into any Port of this Kingdom any Foreign Wheat or Wheat-Meal on Payment of the low Duties, any Thing in the said Orders to the contrary notwithstanding.

And whereas by the said before-mentioned Orders it is ordered and declared, that nothing therein contained is intended to prevent the Importation of Wheat or Wheat-Meal for the Purpose of being warehoused, without Payment of Duty, according to the Provisions of an Act, passed in the 13th Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, “ An Act to regulate the Importation and Exportation of Corn,” and that the same may be again delivered out, subject to such and the like Securities, Regulations, Restrictions and Conditions, as are specified and provided with respect to the landing,

lodging and securing in Warehouses, and delivering out of Corn or Flour so imported, without Payment of Duty, by the said Act, passed in the 13th Year of His Majesty's Reign, or any subsequent Acts; His Majesty doth hereby order and declare, that any Wheat or Wheat-Flour, which has been so warehoused, or may be so warehoused, shall and may, by virtue of the Provisions of the said Act of the 13th Year of His Majesty's Reign, be delivered, in order to be used or consumed in this Kingdom, the Person or Persons so taking out the same having first paid down, in ready Money, such Duties as shall, at the Time of taking out the said Wheat or Wheat-Flour, be due and payable for Wheat or Wheat-Flour imported into the same Port, subject to all the Regulations contained in the said before-mentioned Act.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Select Committee appointed to try and determine the Merits of the Petition of William Paxton, Esquire, and also of the Petition of several Persons whose Names are thereunto subscribed, on Behalf of themselves and others, being legal Electors of Members to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Newark, in the County of Nottingham, severally complaining of an undue Election and Return for the said Borough of Newark, have this Day reported to the House of Commons, That it appeared to the said Select Committee, that the Merits of the Petitions did in Part depend upon the Right of Election; and that thereupon the said Committee required the Counsel for the several Parties to deliver to the Clerk of the said Committee Statements in Writing of the Right of Election for which they respectively contended. That in consequence thereof the Counsel for the said Petitioner, William Paxton, Esquire, and also for the said Petitioners, Electors of the Borough of Newark, delivered in a Statement as follows: "Statement on the Part of the Petitioners, with Regard to the Right of Election." "The Words of the last Determination of the House of Commons, in the Resolution of 11th January, 1699, (That the Mayor, Aldermen and Inhabitants within the Bo-

Nottingham, who pay or ought to pay Scot and Lot within the said Borough, have a Right to vote at the Election of Members to serve in Parliament for the said Borough) express so correctly the Right for which the Petitioners contend, that they can scarcely employ any other Language that would serve to elucidate, or render more plain, the Meaning of those Words, but, in Compliance with the Requisition of the Committee, they state that, according to the said Resolution, all Inhabitants who are rated and pay, and also all Inhabitants who by Law ought to be rated and to pay, the Poor and other parochial Taxes, have a Right to vote at the Election of Members to serve in Parliament for the said Borough." That the Counsel for the Sitting Members William Crosbie and John Manners Sutton, Esquires, delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Counsel for the Sitting Members contend that the Construction of the last Resolution of the House of Commons of the 11th Day of January, 1699-1700, (That the Mayor, Alderman and all the Inhabitants within the said Borough of Newark upon Trent, in the County of Nottingham, who pay or ought to pay Scot and Lot within the said Borough, have a Right to vote at the Election of Members to serve in Parliament for the said Borough) is, that the Mayor and Alderman, and all the Inhabitants within the said Borough, who being rated to the Parish Levies or Assessments, have actually paid, or will pay in the Course of the Collection, or are compellable by Law to pay, or are left out of the Rate by the Fraud and Criminal Conduct of those who have the Management of the Rates, or of the Justices at the Sessions to which the Appeal from the Rate lies, or who, by being improperly left out of the Rate, have not had Time to appeal, or to try their Appeal, before the Election of Members to serve in Parliament, or who have come in the Occupation of rateable Property subsequent to the Allowance of the Rate immediately preceding the Election, and have not been therein inserted, have a Right to vote at the Election of Members to serve in Parliament for the said Borough." That upon the Statement delivered in by the Counsel for the said several Petitioners, the said Select Committee have determined, "That the Right of Election, as set forth in the said Statement, is not the Right of Election for the said Borough of Newark." That upon the Statement delivered in by the Counsel for the Sitting Members, the said Select Committee have determined, "That the Right of Election, as set forth in the said Statement, is not the Right of Election for the said Borough of Newark." That the said Select Committee, having duly considered the said Statements, and the Evidence adduced before them touching the Right of Election, have determined, "That the Right of voting for Members to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Newark, in the County of Nottingham, is in the Mayor, Aldermen and all the Inhabitants paying Scot and Lot within the said Borough." I do hereby give this Notice, in pursuance of the Directions of the Act made in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for the further Regulation of the Trials of Controverted Elections, or Returns of Members to serve in Parliament."
