By the KING, PROCLAMATION,

For Encouraging Seamen and Landmen to enter themfelves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War.

GEORGE R.

THEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all fuch Seamen and Landmen who shall voluntatily enter themselves in Our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation: And We do hereby promise and declare, That all fuch Able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty; nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Thirty-first Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or Officers employed in Tenders, or at Rendezvous on Shore, for Railing Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Three Pounds each Man; and all fuch Ordinary Seamen, of the Ages above mentioned, fit for Our Service, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Two Pounds each Man: And all fuch Able-Bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man, as Our Royal Bounty; such respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Cheque, residing at the Ports or Places where Majesty's Commission, for declaring His Reyal Assent to

the Ships, into which they shall be entered, shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Seamen and Landmen. And We do declare; that the Qualifications of the Seamen and Landmen, fo entering themselves as aforesaid, shall be certified by the Captain, Master, and Boatswain of the Ship or Vessel where they shall enter. And, for Prevention of any Abuses, by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the faid Bounty-Money, We do hereby declare and command, that such Scamen and Landmen, belonging to any of Our Ships or Veffels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our faid Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the faid Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be feverely punished according to their Demerits.

An Ast for appointing Commissioners for putting in Execution an Ast of this Session of Parliament, intituled, An Ast for granting an Aid to His Majesty by a Land Tax to be raised in Great Britain, for the Service of the Year One thousand seven hundred and ninety-one.

An AA for removing any Doubt respecting the Sale or Mortgage of Annuities, pursuant to an AA made in the Twenty-fixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, An AA to enable the East India Company to raise Money by a Sale of Annuities, and by increasing their Capital Stock.

An Act for altering and amending so much of an Act, passed in the Twenty eighth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, An Act for removing any Doubt respecting the Power of the Commissioners for the Assure of India to direct that the Expence of raising, transporting and maintaining such Troops as may be judged necessary for the Security of the British Territories and Possessions in the East Indies, should be destrayed out of the Revenues arising from the said Territories and Possessions, and for limiting the Application of the said Revenues in the Manner therein mentioned, as relates to such Directions as shall be given or approved by the said Commissioners with respect to the Payment of certain Proportions of His Majesty's Forces in India, and of the European Forces of the East India Company therein specified.

An Act to continue the Laws now in Force for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majefty's Dominions and the Inhabitants of the Territories belonging to the United States of America, for far as the Same relate to the Trade and Commerce carried on between this Kingdom and the Inhabitants of the Countries belonging to the Said United States.

An Ast to indemnify juch Persons as have omitted to qualify themselves for Offices and Employments, and to indemnify Justices of the Peace or others who have omitted to register or deliver in their Qualifications within the Time limited by Law, and for giving surther Time for those Purposes; and to indemnify Members and Officers in Cities, Corporations and Borough Towns, whose Admissions have been omitted to be stamped according to Law, or, having been stamped, have been lost or missaid, and for allowing them Time to provide Admissions duly stamped; to give further Time to such Persons as have omitted to make and sile Affidavits of the Execution of Indentures of Clerks to Attornies and Solicitors; and for indemnifying Deputy Lieutenants and Officers of the Militia, who have neglected to transmit Descriptions of their Qualifications to the Clerks of the Peace within the Time limited by Law, and for giving surther Time for that Purpose.

An Act for amending an Act, made in the Two ntyninth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, for

HEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, " An Act " to continue, for a limited Time, certain Provisions contained in an Act made in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution certain Or-" ders of Council respecting the Importation and Exportation of Corn and Grain, and also certain " Orders issued by the Governor-General of His " Majesty's Colonies in America, and for preventing " Suits in consequence of the same, and for mak-" ing further Provisions relative thereto, relating " to the Importation and Exportation of Corn and "Grain; and to authorize His Majesty to permit " the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Meal or Flour, and to prohibit the Importation thereof on the low

" Duties,"

"Duties," it was enacted, that at any Time before lodging and fecuring in Warehouses, and delivering the 28th Day of February, 1791, it should be lawful, out of Corn or Flour so imported, without Payment for His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, (among other Things) to prohibit, for a limited Time, the Importation on the low Duties of ForeignWheat, Wheat-Flour, Rye, Rye-Meal, Barley, Barley-Meal, Oats, Oat-Meal, Pease and Beans, and in like Manner to recall such Prohibition, if Circumstances should appear so to require; and all Persons acting contrary to such Prohibition were thereby made liable to the Penalties and Forfeitures therein mentioned.

And whereas by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, " An Act to con-"tinue and amend fo much of Two Acts, made " in the last Session of Parliament, as relates " to the Importation and Exportation of Corn and " Grain, and to the authorizing His Majesty to " permit the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Meal or " Flour, and to prohibit the Importation thereof " on the low Duries," the faid beforementioned Act was further continued in Force until the 10th Day of June, 1791.

And whereas, in confequence of Two Orders in Council, the one dated the 13th of October, 1790, and the other dated the 18th of February, 1791, Foreign Wheat and Wheat-Meal are now prohibited to be imported at the low Duties: And whereas it appears that the Price of Wheat, fince the issuing of the said Orders, is considerably risen, and it is on that Account become expedient to allow the same to be imported on the low Duties; His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by virtue of the Powers vefted in Him by the before-mentioned Acts, hereby revoke fo much of the faid before-mentioned Orders as relate to the Importation of Foreign Wheat and Wheat-Meal at the low Duties: And His Majesty doth hereby order, by and with the Advice aforesaid, that until the 10th Day of June next ensuing, it shall be lawful to import into any Port of this Kingdom any Foreign Wheat or Wheat-Meal on Payment of the low Duties, any Thing in the faid Orders to the contrary notwithstanding.

And whereas by the faid before-mentioned Orders it is ordered and declared, that nothing therein contained is intended to prevent the Importation of Wheat or Wheat-Meal for the Purpose of being warehoused, without Payment of Duty, according to the Provisions of an Act, passed in the 13th Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act to " regulate the Importation and Exportation of " Corn," and that the fame may be again dclivered out, subject to such and the like Securities, Regulations, Restrictions and Conditions, as are specified and provided with respect to the landing,

of Duty, by the said Act, passed in the 13th Year of His Majesty's Reign, or any subsequent Acts; His Maiesty doth hereby order and declare, that any Wheat or Wheat-Flour, which has been fo warehoused, or may be so warehoused, shall and may, by virtue of the Provisions of the said Act of the 13th Year of His Majesty's Reign, be delivered, in order to be used or confumed in this Kingdom, the Person or Persons so taking out the same having first paid down, in ready Money, fuch Daties as shall, at the Time of taking out the faid Wheat or Wheat-Flour, be due and payable for Wheat or Wheat-Flour imported into the fame Port, subject to all the Regulations contained in the faid before-mentioned Act.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

WHEREAS the Select Committee appointed to try and determine the select Committee appointed to try and determine the Merit's of the Petition of William Paxton, Equire, and also of the Petition of several Persons whose Names are thereunto subscribed, on Behalf of themselves and others, being legal Electors of Members to ferve in Par-liament for the Borough of Newark, in the County of Nottingham, feverally complaining of an undue Election and Return for the fa d Borough of Newark, have this Day reported to the House of Commons, That it appeared to the faid Select Committee, that the Merits of the Petitions did in Part depend upon the Right-of Election; and that thereupon the faid Committee required the Counsel for the several Parties to deliver to the Clerk of the faid Committee Statements in Writing of the Right of Election for which they respectively contended. That in consequence thereof the Counsel for the said Petitioner, William Paxton, Esquire, and also for the said Petitioners, Electors of the Borough of Newark, delivered in a Statement as follows: "Statement on " the Part of the Petitioners, with Regard to the Right of Election." " The Words of the last " Determination of the House of Commons, in the "Resolution of 11th January, 1699, (That the " Mayor, Aldermen and Inhabitant; within the Bo-

" rough of Newark upon Trent, in the County of

" Nottingham, who pay or ought to pay Scot and Lot within the faid Borough, have a Right to vote at the Election of Members to serve in Parliament for the faid Borough) express so correctly the Right for which the Petitioners contend, that they can fcarcely employ any other Language that would ferve to elucidate, or render more plain, the Meaning of those Words, but, in Compliance with the Requisition of the Committee, they state that, according to the faid Resolution, all Inhabitants who are rated and pay, and also all Inhabitants who by Law ought to be rated and to pay, the Poor and other parochial Taxes, have a Right to vote at the Election of Members to serve in "Parliament for the faid Borough." That the faid Select Committee, having duly confidered the faid Statements, and the Evidence adduced before them touching the Right of Election, have determined, "That the Right of voting for Mem-" bers to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Newark, in the County of Nottingham, is in the " Mayor, Aldermen and all the Inhabitants paying "Scot and Lot within the faid Borough." 
