A PROCLAMATION,

For Encouraging Seamen and Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen and Landmen who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation: And We do hereby promise and declare, That all such Able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Thirty-first Day of May next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships, or Officers employed in Tenders, or at Rendezvous on Shore, for Raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Three Pounds each Man; and all such Ordinary Seamen, of the Ages above mentioned, fit for Our Service, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Two Pounds each Man: And all such Able-Bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall so enter themselves as

aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man, as Our Royal Bounty; such respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Cheque, residing at the Ports or Places where the Ships, into which they shall be entered, shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Seamen and Landmen. And We do declare, that the Qualifications of the Seamen and Landmen, so entering themselves as aforesaid, shall be certified by the Captain, Master, and Boatswain of the Ship or Vessel where they shall enter. And, for Prevention of any Abuses, by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty-Money, We do hereby declare and command, that such Seamen and Landmen, belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-one, and in the Thirty-first Year of Our Reign.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to continue, for a limited Time, certain Provisions contained in an Act made in this present Session of Parliament, intituled, An Act for indemnifying all Persons who have been concerned in advising or carrying into Execution certain Orders of Council respecting the Importation and Exportation of Corn and Grain, and also certain Orders issued by the Governor-General of His Majesty's Colonies in America, and for preventing Suits in consequence of the same, and for making further Provisions relative thereto, relating to the Importation and Exportation of Corn and Grain; and to authorize His Majesty to permit the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Meal or Flour, and to prohibit the Importation thereof on the low Duties," it was enacted, that at any Time before the 28th Day of February, 1791, it should be lawful for His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, (among other Things) to prohibit, for a limited Time, the Importation on the low Duties of Foreign-Wheat, Wheat-Flour, Rye, Rye-Meal, Barley, Barley-Meal, Oats, Oat-Meal, Pease and Beans, and in like Manner to recall such Prohibition, if Circumstances should appear so to require; and all Persons acting contrary to such Prohibition were thereby made liable to the Penalties and Forfeitures therein mentioned.

And whereas by an Act passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled, "An Act to continue and amend so much of Two Acts, made in the last Session of Parliament, as relates to the Importation and Exportation of Corn and Grain, and to the authorizing His Majesty to permit the Exportation of Corn, Grain, Meal or Flour, and to prohibit the Importation thereof on the low Duties," the said beforementioned Act was further continued in Force until the 10th Day of June, 1791.

And whereas, in consequence of Two Orders in Council, the one dated the 13th of October, 1790, and the other dated the 18th of February, 1791, Foreign Wheat and Wheat-Meal are now prohibited to be imported at the low Duties: And whereas it appears that the Price of Wheat, since the issuing of the said Orders, is considerably risen, and it is on that Account become expedient to allow the

same to be imported on the low Duties; His Majesty doth, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, by virtue of the Powers vested in Him by the before-mentioned Acts, hereby revoke so much of the said before-mentioned Orders as relate to the Importation of Foreign Wheat and Wheat-Meal at the low Duties: And His Majesty doth hereby order, by and with the Advice aforesaid, that until the 10th Day of June next ensuing, it shall be lawful to import into any Port of this Kingdom any Foreign Wheat or Wheat-Meal on Payment of the low Duties, any Thing in the said Orders to the contrary notwithstanding.

And whereas by the said before-mentioned Orders it is ordered and declared, that nothing therein contained is intended to prevent the Importation of Wheat or Wheat-Meal for the Purpose of being warehoused, without Payment of Duty, according to the Provisions of an Act, passed in the 13th Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to regulate the Importation and Exportation of Corn," and that the same may be again delivered out, subject to such and the like Securities, Regulations, Restrictions and Conditions, as are specified and provided with respect to the landing, lodging and securing in Warehouses, and delivering out of Corn or Flour so imported, without Payment of Duty, by the said Act, passed in the 13th Year of His Majesty's Reign, or any subsequent Acts; His Majesty doth hereby order and declare, that any Wheat or Wheat-Flour, which has been so warehoused, or may be so warehoused, shall and may, by virtue of the Provisions of the said Act of the 13th Year of His Majesty's Reign, be delivered, in order to be used or consumed in this Kingdom, the Person or Persons so taking out the same having first paid down, in ready Money, such Duties as shall, at the Time of taking out the said Wheat or Wheat-Flour, be due and payable for Wheat or Wheat-Flour imported into the same Port, subject to all the Regulations contained in the said before-mentioned Act.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

THIS Day his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, with the usual Solemnity, and the Commons being sent for, gave the Royal Assent to

An Act for granting for One Year the several Duties therein mentioned, in Lieu of all other Duties payable upon the Articles therein specified, during the said Term; and for continuing the Effect of a Treaty of Commerce and Navigation between His Majesty and the Most Christian King; and for regulating the Trade between this Kingdom and His Majesty's Colonies; and for other Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for regulating and extending the Tobacco, Sugar and Coffee Trade.

An Act for granting unto His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, a Tax on all Salaries, Profits of Employments, Fees and Pensions, and certain Duties upon Carriages; and for licensing Hawkers, Pedlars, and other Persons therein mentioned.

An Act for granting to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, several Duties therein mentioned, to be levied by the Commissioners for managing the Stamp Duties.

An Act for granting to His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, certain Duties and Rates upon the Portage and Conveyance of all Letters and Packets within this Kingdom.

An Act for securing the Payment of the Annuities, and of the Interest upon the Principal Sums therein

provided for, and towards the Discharge of such Principal Sums in such Manner as therein is directed; and for enabling the Officers of His Majesty's Treasury to receive certain Sums for a limited Time, in Manner therein mentioned, and for other Purposes.

An Act for granting the Sum of Five Thousand Pounds to the Dublin Society, for the Purposes therein mentioned.

An Act for regulating the Payment of Bounties on the Exportation of certain Manufactures of this Kingdom.

An Act for granting the several Sums therein mentioned for certain Pious and Charitable Purposes.

An Act for granting the Sum of Four Thousand Pounds to the Trustees of the Linen Manufacture, and for other Purposes.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters within this Kingdom.

An Act for further continuing an Act, intitled, An Act for facilitating the Trade and Intercourse between this Kingdom and the United States of America.

An Act to amend an Act for improving the Turf-pike Road from Kinnegad to Athlone.

An Act for amending the several Laws for making, widening and repairing the Road from Dublin to Malahide, and the other Roads leading to Dublin over Ballybough Bridge, in the said Acts mentioned; and for enabling the Trustees for the said Purposes to borrow further Sums of Money for such Purposes; and for continuing the said Acts for a further Term; and for improving the Neighbourhood of Ballybough Bridge.

Florence, March 8.

Yesterday a Proclamation was issued, notifying the Emperor's entire Cession of Tuscany to His Royal Highness the Arch-Duke Ferdinand; and, at the same Time, the First Order of His Royal Highness, as Great Duke of Tuscany, confirming all the Laws and Regulations now existing; and continuing the Regency and all Persons, Civil and Military, in their Employments. Upon this Occasion there was a Discharge of all the Guns of the Citadel.

Vienna, March 12.

The King of Naples, accompanied by his Ambassador at this Court, left this Capital on Thursday Morning, and arrived the same Evening at Newstadt, where he staid the 11th, and proceeded the next Day on his Journey to Venice.
