Count Ankewicz, Envoy Extraordinary from the King and Republic of Poland to this Court, arrived here last Week, and had his First Audience of His Danish Majesty on Wednesday last.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that, on the 2d Day of March instant, the Albion Mill, in the Parish of Christ Church, in the County of Surry, was discovered to be on Fire, by which the same was totally consumed, together with Wheat, Meal, Flour, Bran and Pollard, Coals and other Stores to a very considerable Amount; and that there is great Reason to believe that the same was wilfully and maliciously set on Fire by some Person or Persons unknown.
