P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-fifth Day of March last, to promise and declare, That a Bounty of Three Pounds should be paid to every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds to every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for His Majesty's Service, and a Bounty of Twenty Shillings to all such Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of May then next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or Officers employed in Tenders, or at Rendezvous on Shore for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Navy. And whereas His Majesty was also pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Sixth Day of April last, to promise and declare, That a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman should be paid, in the Manner thereby directed, to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service on or before the said Thirty-first Day of May then next, by any of

His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom. And whereas the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards is near expiring, and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Rewards should continue to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby ordered, That the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first of this instant May to the Thirtieth Day of June next, inclusive: — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

*May it please your Majesty,*

**W**E have received with the utmost Respect and Gratitude the gracious Letter with which your Majesty has been pleased to honour this General Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

The distinguished Marks of Approbation which your Majesty has formerly vouchsafed to give us, and condescended so graciously at this Time to repeat, afford us the highest Satisfaction, and are to

us most animating Motives to persevere in our Zeal for promoting sound Learning and true Religion.

As we gladly embrace every Opportunity of expressing our Duty and Affection to your Majesty's Person, and of our firm Attachment to your mild and auspicious Government, your gracious Acceptance of these humble Expressions of our Loyalty and Zeal, and your Assurances that we shall always meet with your Royal Protection, and that it is your Majesty's Determination to maintain and support the Church of Scotland as established by Law, in the full and free Enjoyment of all her just Rights and Privileges, at once fill us with the most lively Gratitude, and encourage us to repose the greatest Confidence in your Majesty's Goodness.

We beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that it shall be our Study to direct our Proceedings in future to the same laudable Purposes as heretofore, and to continue our Attention to such Measures as are best calculated for diffusing the Principles of genuine Christianity, and for infilling into the Minds of all Ranks of Men committed to our Care a conscientious Regard to moral Duties, and a strict Obedience to the Laws, and for promoting the general Peace and Happiness of Society: And, to give Dignity and Authority to our Proceedings, we shall be careful to avoid all unnecessary Disputes and superfluous Discussions, and to maintain that Harmony which hitherto has obtained your Majesty's gracious Approbation.

We consider your Majesty's Appointment of David Earl of Leven again to represent your Royal Person in this Assembly as a fresh Mark of your gracious Condescension and Goodness to us. His known Loyalty to your Majesty, his Attachment, like that of his Ancestors, to the Church of Scotland, his tender Regard to the Interests of Religion and Virtue, and the Fidelity with which he has so frequently discharged the Duties of the high and important Office which he now fills, render him most acceptable to us.

We accept of your Majesty's Donation of One Thousand Pounds, for the Propagation of the Protestant Religion in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland, as a fresh Mark of your Majesty's paternal Care of all your Subjects: As we feel ourselves highly honoured in being made the Instruments of your Majesty's pious Intentions, it shall be our Study to fulfil them by the most prudent and effectual Application of the Sum that is intrusted to us.

We trust that all our Proceedings shall be conducted with that Charity, Unanimity, and Brotherly Love, and with that Moderation, which your Majesty's paternal Care leads you so anxiously to desire; and we accept of your earnest Wishes for our Prosperity and Welfare as a most endearing Proof of your Majesty's Favour and Affection.

That the God and Father of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ may direct your Majesty's Councils to the public Good; that He may bless you with every domestic Comfort; that He may bless the Queen, the Prince of Wales, and all the Royal Family: That, after preserving your Majesty long to be the Guardian of our free Constitution, and of the Rights of your People, He may call you, full of Years and of Glory, to the Possession of an Heavenly Crown; and that He may grant to your Royal Race, through future Generations, to fill with Dignity the British

Throne, and to promote the Interest of His Kingdom on Earth, are the fervent Prayers of,

JOHN Coryton, of the Borough of Fowey in the County of Cornwall, Esquire, Thomas Graham, of the same Place, Esquire, Henry Hawkins Tremayne, of Helligan in the same County, Clerk, and John Rashleigh, of Penquite in the same County, Esquire, Persons who have a Right to choose, nominate and appoint the Returning Officer for the said Borough, having this Day presented their Petition to the House of Commons, setting forth, That it appears to the Petitioners, by the Votes of the House of the Seventh Day of March last, that the Select Committee of the House who were appointed to try and determine the Merits of a Petition of the Honourable Richard Edgcumbe, commonly called Lord Valletort, and Philip Rashleigh, Esquire, then before the House, and also another Petition of the Right Honourable Molyneux Lord Shuldham and Sir Ralph Payne, Knight of the Bath, and also another Petition of John Rashleigh, Richard Hennah, Samuel Nicolls, Nevil Norway, and Benjamin Bloomfield, of Fowey in the County of Cornwall aforesaid, being Persons who had a Right at the last Election of Burgesses to serve in Parliament for the said Borough, on Behalf of themselves and others, who were, at the said Election, lawful Electors for the said Borough, severally complaining of an undue Election and Double Return for the said Borough, did report to the House, That the Merits of the Petitions did in Part depend upon the Right of chusing, nominating or appointing the Returning Officer who was to make Return of such Election; and that thereupon the said Select Committee required the Counsel for the several Parties to deliver to the Clerk of the said Committee Statements in Writing of the Right of chusing, nominating or appointing the Returning Officer for the said Borough for which they respectively contended. That in consequence thereof the Counsel for the Petitioners Lord Shuldham and Sir Ralph Payne delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Portreeve is the Returning Officer at Elections to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Fowey. The Portreeve for the said Borough is chosen or presented by the Homage, at a Court holden for the said Manor of Fowey, usually soon after Michaelmas, by the Steward or the Deputy Steward of the Prince of Wales, Lord of the said Borough and Manor in Right of his Duchy of Cornwall." That the Counsel for the said Petitioners, Lord Valletort and Philip Rashleigh, and also for the said Petitioners, John Rashleigh, Richard Hennah, Samuel Nicolls, Nevil Norway and Benjamin Bloomfield, on Behalf of themselves and others, delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Persons intitled to elect the Portreeve of the Borough of Fowey are those who are capable of holding that Office, that is, such Prince's Tenants only as have been duly admitted on the Court Rolls of the Manor of the said Borough, and have done their Fealty; and such Persons only are duly admitted whose Lands were anciently and continue to be held immediately of the Duke of Cornwall, as Parcel of his said Manor of the said Borough, and whose Titles to those Lands have been presented at a Court Baron by a Sworn Homage or Jury of the Freeholders of the said Borough." That the said Select Committee had duly considered of the said Statements, and the Evidence adduced before them touching the Right of chusing, nominating or appointing the Re-

turning Officer for the said Borough of Fowey, and had determined, "That the Portreeve of the Borough of Fowey is the Returning Officer for the said Borough; and that it is necessary that such Returning Officer should be chosen or presented by a Homage or Jury of Prince's Tenants, duly admitted on the Court Rolls of the Manor of the said Borough; and that Prince's Tenants admitted by the Steward or Deputy Steward, at a Court holden in the said Manor, are duly admitted, and that the Presentment of the Homage is not necessary to such Admission." That the Petitioners conceive themselves to be greatly aggrieved by such Determination of the said Select Committee, and therefore pray that they may be admitted as Parties to oppose that Right of chusing, nominating and appointing the Returning Officer of the said Borough who is to make Return of Members elected for the said Borough, which has been deemed valid in the Judgment of the said Select Committee, and so reported by them as aforesaid to the House. I do hereby give Notice that the House has appointed Saturday the Twenty-seventh Day of August next, at Three o'Clock in the Afternoon, to take the said Petition into Consideration. Yesterday being the Anniversary of Her Imperial Majesty's Birth-Day, it was observed at Court in the usual Manner, and in the Evening there was a Ball and Illuminations.

*Leghorn, May 2.*

On Friday last their Royal Highnesses the Great Duke and Duchess, accompanied by the Arch-Dukes Charles and Leopold, arrived here. They were received at the Gates of the City with the usual Formalities, by the Governor and principal Military Officers, with a Royal Salute of 101 Guns from the Forts and Batteries. They were received at the Palace by the Civil Magistrates and Nobility, and also the Consuls, with their respective Factories, who had the Honor of being presented to their Royal Highnesses. In the Evening there were Illuminations and other public Demonstrations of Joy. Their Royal Highnesses, during their Stay in this City, very graciously partook of the various Entertainments provided by the different Nations upon the Occasion; and this Day set out on their Return to Florence.

NOTICE for Annual Exercise at Preston, the 25th Day of July, 1791, in pursuance of the Directions of an Act passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for amending and reducing into one Act of Parliament the Laws relating to the Militia in that Part of Great Britain called England;"

Notice is hereby given, That the Battalion of the Royal Lancashire Militia is to assemble at Preston, on Monday the 25th Day of July next, there to be trained and exercised for the Space of Twenty-four Days, exclusive of the Two allowed for coming and Two for returning.

The Act directs that every Militia Man or Substitute, as well those who were exercised last Year, as those who were dismissed, who shall not appear at the Time and Place appointed, shall be deemed a Deserter, and, if taken during the Time of Exercise, shall be liable to Punishment by Military Law; if not taken till after the Time of Exercise, shall forfeit and pay the Sum of Twenty Pounds; or, in Default of Payment, shall be committed to Prison for the Space of Six Months, or until he shall have paid the said Penalty.
