The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-fifth Day of March last, to promise and declare, That a Bounty of Three Pounds should be paid to every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds to every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for His Majesty's Service, and a Bounty of Twenty Shillings to all such Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of May then next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or Officers employed in Tenders, or at Rendezvous on Shore for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Navy. And whereas His Majesty was also pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Sixth Day of April last, to promise and declare, That a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every Able and Ordinary Seaman should be paid, in the Manner thereby directed, to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service on or before the said Thirty-first Day of May then next, by any of

His Majesty's Sea Officers appointed to raise Men on Shore, or by the Captains and Commanders of any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels in the Ports or on the Coasts of this Kingdom. And whereas the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards is near expiring, and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service that the said Bounties and Rewards should continue to be paid for some Time longer; His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby ordered, That the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties and Rewards be prolonged and extended from the said Thirty-first of this instant May to the Thirtieth Day of June next, inclusive: — Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

wholly depend upon the Right of Election; and that therefore the said Committee had required the Counsel for the several Parties to deliver to the Clerk of the said Committee Statements in Writing of the Right of Election for which they respectively contended. That in consequence thereof the Counsel for the said Petitioners, Charles Meilish and John Anstruther, and the said other Persons, had delivered in a Statement respecting the Right of Election for the said Borough as follows: "The Right of Election for Members to serve in Parliament for the Borough of Pontefract in the County of York is in Persons having within the said Borough a Freehold of Burgage Tenure, paying a Burgage Rent." That the Counsel for the Sitting Members, John Smyth and William Sotheron, Esquires, had also delivered in a Statement as follows: "The Counsel for the Sitting Members state; the Right of Election for the Borough of Pontefract to be in the Inhabitants Householders Resiants." That upon the Statement delivered in by the Counsel for the said several Petitioners, the said Select Committee report that they have determined, "That the Right of Election as set forth in the said Statement is not the Right of Election for the Borough of Pontefract in the County of York." That upon the Statement delivered in by the Counsel for the Sitting Members, the said Select Committee report that they have determined, "That the Right of Election as set forth in the said Statement is the Right of Election for the said Borough of Pontefract." And the Petitioners further shew, that they are advised, and they trust they can maintain, that the Judgment of the said Select Committee, reported to the House touching the different Rights of Election contained in the said Statements, is erroneous; and that the Right of Election which hath been deemed valid in the Judgment of such Select Committee is not the Right of Election for the said Borough. Therefore, and to prevent the said Judgment of the said Select Committee from becoming final and conclusive, the Petitioners pray, that they may be admitted as Parties, according to the Form of the Statute in that Case lately made and provided, to oppose that Right of Election in Favour of which the said Select Committee hath reported as above set forth, and that they may have such further and other Relief in the Premises as to the House shall seem meet, and the Nature of the Case may require. I do hereby give Notice that the House has appointed Monday the Twenty-ninth Day of August next, at Three o'Clock in the Afternoon, to take the said Petition into Consideration. HIS late Majesty having been graciously pleased, by His Warrant under His Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th Day of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the Relief of Poor Widows of Commission and Warrant Officers of the Royal Navy; These are to give Notice, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth; as also with the Clerks of the Checque at Deptford, Woolwich, and Sheerness; and with the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where all such Widows as intend to lay in their Claims may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose. But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply, by Letter, to Mr. Thomas Kite, at the Admiralty-Office, who will send them all necessary Information. THE Post-Boy bringing the Mail from Ailsbury to Hemel Hempstead, containing the Bags of Letters from Ailsbury, Winslow, Tring, Wendover and Berkhamstead for London, with the Bye-Letters from Ailsbury.

Ailsbury and Tring, was stop'd between the Hours of Ten and Eleven o'Clock last Night by a Man on Foot, who appeared to be luffy, between Berkhamstead and Hemel Hempstead, who seized the Bridle of his Horse, and made him dismount. The Robber then fastened the Horse to a Gate on the Road, and took the Boy into a Field at some Distance, where he tied his Hands, blindfolded him and fastened him to a Gate, and afterwards rode away with the Mail and Horse.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person, whether an Accomplice in the Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Person who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Reward, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
