General Post Office, Saturday, May 28, 1791.

THE Post-Boy bringing the Mail from Ailebury to Hemel Hempstead, containing the Bags of Letters from Ailebury, Winslow, Tring, Wendover and Berkhamstead for London, with the Bye-Letters from Ailebury and Tring, was stop'd between the Hours of Ten and Eleven o'Clock last Night by a Man on Foot, who appeared to be lusty, between Berkhamstead and Hemel Hempstead, who seized the Bridle of his Horse, and made him dismount. The Robber then fastened the Horse to a Gate on the Road, and took the Boy into a Field at some Distance, where he tied his Hands, blindfolded him and fastened him to a Gate, and afterwards rode away with the Mail and Horse.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person, whether an Accomplice in the Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Person who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Reward, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
