THE King has been pleased to constitute and appoint the Right Honorable William Pitt, the Honorable Edward James Eliot, the Right Honorable Richard Earl of Mornington of the Kingdom of Ireland, Knight of the Illustrious Order of St. Patrick, the Right Honorable John Jefferies Pratt, (commonly called Lord Viscount Bayham) and Richard Hopkins, Esq; to be Commissioners for executing the Office of Treasurer of His Majesty's Exchequer.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to pass the Great Seal, empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Durham to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the Death of the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor Thomas Thurlow, late Bishop thereof; and His Majesty has also been pleased, by His Royal Sign Manual, to recommend to the said Dean and Chapter the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor Shute Barrington, now Bishop of Salisbury, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of Durham.

The King has been pleased to present the Reverend John Weller Poley to the Rectory of Kertesse and Boxsted, in the County of Suffolk and Diocese of Norwich, void by the Death of the Reverend Harvey Aspin.

General Post Office, Saturday, May 28, 1791.

THE Post-Boy bringing the Mail from Ailsbury to Hemel Hempstead, containing the Bags of Letters from Ailsbury, Winslow, Tring, Wendover and Berkhamstead for London, with the Bye-Letters from Ailsbury and Tring, was stop'd between the Hours of Ten and Eleven o'Clock last Night by a Man on Foot, who appeared to be lusty, between Berkhamstead and Hemel Hempstead, who seized the Bridle of his Horse, and made him dismount. The Robber then fastened the Horse to a Gate on the Road, and took the Boy into a Field at some Distance, where he tied his Hands, blindfolded him and fastened him to a Gate, and afterwards rode away with the Mail and Horse.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person who committed this Robbery, will be entitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person, whether an Accomplice in the Robbery, or knowing thereof, shall make Discovery, whereby the Person who committed the same may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Party, be entitled to the same Reward, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.

East India-House, June 17, 1791.

AT A COURT OF DIRECTORS HELD ON FRIDAY THE 3d OF JUNE, 1791.

WHERRAS the Court of Directors of the East India Company have Reason to believe that an illicit and unlawful Trade is carried on between Europe and India by British Subjects, under the false Colours and Passes of Foreign Nations: And as it is their Duty to suppress the same, it is resolved, That Prosecutions shall be commenced against such Persons residing within the Jurisdiction of the Courts of England, as shall upon Information be found (by the Directors) offending against the Laws now in Force for the Prevention of all illicit and unlawful Commerce to the East Indies.

It is likewise resolved, That if any Servant of the Company's, Civil or Military, or any Person holding Office or Employment, or receiving Salary or Wages from the East India Company, shall be proved to have any Concern, either directly or indirectly, as Principal or Agent, for the carrying on any illicit or unlawful Trade in, to or from the East Indies, such Person, upon

being found guilty of the same before the Governor-General of India, or the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court of Judicature in Bengal, or any Two of the Puisne Judges of the said Court, or any Two Members of the General Council at Fort William, or before the Governor and Council of any of the Company's Settlements in India, or before the Company's Supra-Cargoes at China, shall be dismissed the Service of the East India Company, and rendered incapable of ever serving again in any Capacity whatsoever.

And it is further resolved, That if any other Description of Persons residing in India shall be found guilty of the like Offence, such Person or Persons shall be considered as having forfeited all Right to the Company's Licence for continuing in India, and are to be sent to England to be prosecuted as the Law directs.

Resolved, That the above Resolutions be published in the London Gazette, together with an Abstract of several Acts of Parliament now in Force, for securing the lawful Trade to the East Indies.

Abstract of several Acts of Parliament now in Force made for securing to the East India Company the sole Trade to, in and from the East Indies, and for preventing British Subjects (without the Company's Licence) from going or trading to, in or from the East Indies, either directly from this Kingdom, or under Foreign Commissions; and from being interested or concerned in any Foreign East India Company to be erected.

BY the following Acts of Parliament now in Force it is enacted as follows, viz.

9 and 10 Will. III. cap. 44.

Enacts, That the Persons or Corporations who, pursuant to that Act, should have a Right to trade to the East Indies, should have the whole and sole Trade and Traffick there; and if any other British Subjects should, directly or indirectly, visit, haunt, frequent, trade, traffick or adventure in, to or from the East Indies, contrary to the Meaning of that Act, they should forfeit and lose the Ships and Vessels employed, with their Guns, Tackle, &c. and the Goods laden thereon, and the Proceed of the same, and double the Value thereof.

5 Geo. I. cap. 21.

By an Act passed in the Fifth Year of His Majesty King George the First, all British Subjects, except those licensed by the East India Company, are prohibited from going to the East Indies: And to the End such Offenders may be brought to Justice, the East India Company are empowered to arrest and seize such Offenders in the East Indies, and to send them to England, there to answer for the said Offence. And every British Subject who shall procure, solicit for, obtain, or act under, any Commission, Authority or Pass, from any Foreign Prince or State, to sail, or go in Trade, in or to the East Indies, incurs and forfeits, for every such Offence, FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS.

7 Geo. I. cap. 21.

By another Act passed in the Seventh Year of His Majesty King George the First, every British Subject who shall go to, or shall trade or adventure in, to or from, the East Indies, (contrary to the Laws

in

in Being) and shall be convicted thereof in any of His Majesty's Courts of Record at Westminster, is to pay and suffer such Fine and Imprisonment as the Court shall think fit.

And all British Subjects who shall fail, go or repair to the East Indies, contrary to Law, shall be deemed and accounted to be a Trader, and to have traded and trafficked there; and all the Goods and Merchandize that shall be bartered or trafficked for in the East Indies, or purchased there, by any such Offenders, or that shall be found in his Custody, or in the Custody of any other Person by his Order or Procurement, are declared to be forfeited, with double the Value thereof; and His Majesty's Attorney-General, at the Relation of the Company, or by his own Authority, is empowered to exhibit Bills in the Exchequer against any Persons trading, dealing, trafficking or adventuring in, to or from the East Indies, contrary to Law, or against any Person concerned as Agent, Factor or Copartner with such illegal Traders, for Discovery thereof, and for Recovery of such Duties and Damages as after mentioned, waving Penalties; and such Person shall answer the said Bills, and not plead or demur to the Discovery thereby sought, and pay His Majesty's Customs and Duties of the Goods and Merchandizes arising, produced or purchased by the said unlawful Trade, and shall also answer and pay to the Company for the same Thirty per Cent. according to the Value thereof in England, as a Satisfaction for Damages, which Damages, by an Act of 10 Geo. III. cap. 47, are increased to One Hundred per Cent.

9 Geo. I. cap. 26.

By an Act passed in the Ninth Year of His Majesty King George the First, all British Subjects are prohibited from subscribing, contributing to, encouraging, or promoting the raising, establishing, or carrying on any Foreign Company, from and after the Twenty-fourth Day of June, 1723, to be raised, formed or erected for trading to the East Indies, and from being interested in or entitled to any Share in the Stock or Capital of such Foreign Company, under Forfeiture of all his, her or their Interest in the Capital, Principal, Stock or Actions of any such Foreign Company, together with treble the Value thereof.

And the Attorney-General is empowered to exhibit Bills of Complaint in the Court of Chancery or Court of Exchequer against such Offenders, for the Discovery of such Offence; which Discovery such Offenders are obliged to make on the Attorney-General's waving in such Bill the said Forfeiture of the treble Value, and insisting only on the single Value thereof; and in such Case the single Value is to be decreed to be paid by such Offender.

And that every British Subject accepting of any Trust, or knowing of any Interest, Share, Part, Proportion or Concern which any other British Subjects shall have or be entitled to in any such Foreign Company, and who shall not, within Six Months next after the accepting such Trust, or coming to the Knowledge of such Interest, Share, Proportion or Concern as aforesaid, truly discover the same, in Writing, to the East India Company, or their Court of Directors, shall forfeit treble the Value of the Interest so accepted in Trust, or so known, and not discovered as aforesaid; and any Person making such Discovery is entitled to a Moiety of the Forfeiture.

And all British Subjects (other than such as are lawfully authorized thereunto) going to or found in the East Indies, are declared guilty of a high Crime and Misdemeanor, and are made liable to Corporal Punishment, Imprisonment or Fine for the same, at the Discretion of the Court where the Prosecution for such Offence shall be commenced.

And every Person so offending may be seized and brought to England, and committed to Goal there, by any One of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, until sufficient Security be given by natural-born Subjects or Denizens to appear in the Court, where such Prosecution shall be commenced, to answer the same, and not depart without Leave of the Court.

3 Geo. II. cap. 14.

By an Act passed in the Third Year of His late Majesty King George the Second, it is enacted, That if any British Subjects (other than the East India Company, and those licensed by them) shall, directly or indirectly, go to, trade, or adventure to or from the East Indies, every such Offender shall incur the Forfeiture and Loss of all the Ships and Vessels employed in such Voyage, Trade or Adventure, and also all the Goods laden thereupon, or that were sent to, acquired, traded or adventured within the East Indies, and all the Proceed and Effects of the same, and double the Value thereof.

21 Geo. III. cap. 65.

The Provisions of the last above Act are repeated in this Act, and it is further enacted, That British Subjects residing in India shall not lend Money to any Foreign Company, or to any Foreign European Merchant or Merchants, nor shall purchase any Goods in India for or on Account of any such Foreign Company, European Merchant or Merchants, or be concerned in lending such Money, or in purchasing such Goods, directly or indirectly, nor shall furnish such Foreign Company, European Merchant or Merchants, with the Credit of Bills drawn upon any Person or Persons in Europe.

And any British Subject in his own Name, or in the Name of any other, carrying on or being concerned in any Trade or Traffick in sending any Kind of Goods and Merchandizes, the Produce or Manufacture of the East Indies or China, to Europe, forfeits double the Value of the Goods so sent to Europe.

IN Consequence of an Address of the House of Commons to His Majesty, and of an Examination made respecting the Efficacy of a Composition discovered by Mr. William Forsyth, for curing Injuries and Defects in Trees, His Majesty has been pleased to grant a Reward to Mr. Forsyth, for disclosing the Method of making and using that Composition; and the following Directions for that Purpose are published accordingly.

Royal Gardens, Kensington, May 11, 1791.

DIRECTIONS for making a Composition for curing Diseases, Defects and Injuries in all Kinds of Fruit and Forest Trees, and the Method of preparing the Trees, and laying on the Composition, by William Forsyth.

Take One Bushel of fresh Cow Dung, Half a Bushel of Lime Rubbish of old Buildings, (that from the Cielings of Rooms is preferable) Half a Bushel of Wood Ashes, and a Sixteenth Part of a Bushel of Pit or River Sand. The Three last Articles are to be sifted fine before they are mixed; then work them well together with a Spade, and afterwards with a wooden Beater, until the Stuff is very smooth, like fine Plaster used for the Cielings of Rooms.

The Composition being thus made, Care must be taken to prepare the Tree properly for its Application, by cutting away all the dead, decayed, and injured Part, till you come to the fresh sound Wood; leaving the Surface of the Wood very smooth, and rounding off the Edges of the Bark with a Draw-knife, or other Instrument, perfectly smooth, which must be particularly attended to: Then lay on the Plaster, about One-eighth of an Inch thick, all over the Part where the Wood or Bark has been so cut away, finishing off the Edges as thin as possible. Then take a Quantity of dry Powder of Wood Ashes, mixed with a Sixth Part of the same Quantity of the Ashes of burnt Bones; put it into a Tin Box, with Holes in the Top, and shake the Powder on the Surface of the Plaster till the Whole is covered over with it, letting it remain for Half an Hour, to absorb the Moisture: Then apply more Powder, rubbing it on gently with the Hand, and repeating the Application of the Powder, till the whole Plaster becomes a dry, smooth Surface.

All Trees cut down near the Ground should have the Surface made quite smooth, rounding it off in a small Degree, as before mentioned; and the dry Powder directed to be used afterwards, should have an equal Quantity of Powder of Alabaster mixed with it, in order the better to resist the dripping of Trees and heavy Rains.

If any of the Composition be left for a future Occasion, it should be kept in a Tub, or other Vessel, and Urine of any Kind poured on it, so as to cover the Surface, otherwise the Atmosphere will greatly hurt the Efficacy of the Application.

Where Lime Rubbish of old Buildings cannot be easily got, take powdered Chalk, or common Lime, after having been slaked a Month at least.

As the Growth of the Tree will gradually affect the Plaster, by raising up its Edges next the Bark, Care should be taken, where that happens, to rub it over with the Finger when Occasion may require, (which is best done when moistened by Rain) that the Plaster may be kept whole, to prevent the Air and Wet from penetrating into the Wood.
