Perfons discovered may be brought to Justice for the fame, fuch Discoverers shall have and receive as a Reward, upon Conviction of fuch Offender or Offenders, the Sum of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for each and every fuch Offender, and also Our gracious Pardon, in case the Person making such Discovery shall himself be liable to be prosecuted for the same, except the Person or Persons so discovering be the Author or Authors of the Paper aforefaid: And the Commissioners for executing the Office of Treasurer of Our Exchequer are hereby required to make Payment accordingly of the faid Rewards. Given at Our Court at St. James's the Twenty-seventh Day of July, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-one, in the Thirty-first Year of Our Reign.

By the KING, PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS it hath been represented unto Us, that a great Number of disorderly Perfons, in and about the Town of Birmingham in Our County of Warwick, did, on the Fourteenth Day of July instant, assemble themselves in a tumultuous Manner, and for several Days thereaster, and during the Time aforesaid, did set Fire to, burn, or otherwife destroy, fundry Dwelling-Houses, Mills, and other Buildings, with the Furniture and other Effects found in the same, to divers of Our Subjects belongin, in the faid Town of Birmingham, and in other Places thereunto adjacent, in Our Counties of Warwick and Worcester; and also Two Meeting Houses, belonging to Protestant Dissenters, in the Town of Birmingham aforefaid; and did also by Force or Terror illegally take Money from divers of Our Subjects: We therefore, taking the fame into Our most ferious Consideration, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish and declare Our Resolution, That the Authors, Abettors and Perpetrators of the said Offences be profecuted as expeditiously as may be, according to the due Course of Law: And We do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Conflables, and all other Our loving Subjects, to be aiding and affilting, to the utmost of their Power, in detecting, apprehending and bringing to Justice the said Offenders: And We are graciously pleased to promise, That if any Person shall discover any other Person or Persons, who are guilty of any of the faid Offences, fo as that the Person or Persons discovered may be prosecuted for the same,

fuch Discoverer shall have and receive as a Reward, upon Conviction of such Offender or Offenders, the Sum of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for each and every fuch Offender, and also Our gracious Pardon for the faid Offence, in case the Person making fuch Discovery shall himself be liable to be profecuted for the same; except the Person who first began to set Fire to, burn or destroy the faid Dwelling-Houses, Mills, and other Buildings: And the Commissioners for executing the Office of Treasurer of Our Exchequer are hereby required to make Payment accordingly of the faid Rewards. Given at Our Court at St. James's the Twenty-seventh Day of July, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninetyone, in the Thirty-first Year of Our Reign.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. THEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Twenty-fifth Day of March last, to promise and declare, (amongst other Things) That a Bounty of Three Pounds should be paid to every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds to every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for His Majesty's Service, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of May then next, voluntarily enter themselves to ferve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, in Manner therein mentioned; which Bounties have been prolonged and extended to the Thirty-first Day of this instant July; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the faid Bounties should continue to be paid to such Able and Ordinary Seamen for some Time longer, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby ordered, That the Time limited for Payment of fuch Bounties be prolonged and extended, and that the same do continue to be paid to every Able and Ordinary Seaman fit for His Majesty's Service, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall, on or before the Thirty-first Day of August next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Regulating Captains, or the Lieutenants employed under them, in London, or with the Captains or Lieutenants of any of His Majesty's Ships or Veffels of War: Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.
