A PROCLAMATION.  
GEORGE R.

**W**HEREAS it hath been represented unto Us, that on the Eleventh Day of this instant July, a certain scandalous and seditious Paper was printed and published in the Town of Birmingham, and published in the Parts thereunto adjacent, in Our Counties of Warwick and Worcester, of the following Tenor:— “ My Countrymen! The Second Year of Gallic Liberty is nearly expired. At the Commencement of the Third on the Fourteenth of this Month, it is devoutly to be wished, that every Enemy to Civil and Religious Despotism would give his Sanction to the Majestic Common Cause, by a Public Celebration of the Anniverfary. Remember that on the Fourteenth of July the Bastille, that high Altar and Castle of Despotism, fell. Remember the Enthusiasm, peculiar to the Cause of Liberty, with which it was attacked. Remember that generous Humanity that taught the oppressed, groaning under the Weight of insulted Rights, to save the Lives of Oppressors! Extinguish the mean Prejudices of Nations; and let your Numbers be collected, and sent as a Free-will Offering to the National Assembly. But is it possible to forget that your own Parliament is venal! Your Ministers hypocritical! Your Clergy legal Oppressors! The Reigning Family extravagant! The Crown of a certain Great Personage be-

“ coming every Day too weighty for the Head that wears it! too weighty for the People who gave it! Your Taxes partial and excessive—Your Representation a cruel Insult upon the sacred Rights of Property, Religion, and Freedom.— But on the Fourteenth of this Month, prove to the political Sycophants of the Day that you reverence the Olive Branch, that you will sacrifice to Public Tranquillity, till the Majority shall exclaim, “ The Peace of Slavery is worse than the War of Freedom.— Of that Moment let Tyrants beware!”—We, therefore, in order to bring to a speedy condign Punishment the Publishers of the Paper aforesaid, and that Practices so highly dangerous to the Public Tranquillity and Welfare may hereafter be prevented, have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation, hereby requiring and enjoining all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Constables, and all other Our loving Subjects, to be aiding and assisting to the utmost of their Power in detecting, apprehending and bringing to Justice the Publishers of the Paper aforesaid: And, for the better Detection of the said Publishers, We are graciously pleased to promise, that if any Person shall discover any other Person or Persons concerned in publishing the printed Paper aforesaid, by distributing the same, or otherwise, so as the Person or Persons discovered may be brought to Justice for the same, such Discoverers shall have and receive as a Reward, upon a Conviction of such Offender or Offenders,

ders, the Sum of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS for each and every such Offender, and also Our gracious Pardon, in case the Person making such Discovery shall himself be liable to be prosecuted for the same, except the Person or Persons so discovering be the Author or Authors of the Paper aforesaid: And the Commissioners for executing the Office of Treasurer of Our Exchequer are hereby required to make Payment accordingly of the said Rewards. Given at Our Court at St. James's the Twenty-seventh Day of July, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-one, in the Thirty-first Year of Our Reign.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council of the 29th of last Month, to direct, that the Bounties granted by His Majesty's Proclamation of the 25th of March, 1791, to Able and Ordinary Seamen, who should enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy as therein mentioned, should be continued until the 31st Day of this instant August: And whereas His Majesty doth judge it no longer necessary to continue the said Bounties; His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order and declare, that the said Bounties shall from henceforth cease, determine, and be no longer paid or payable, any Thing in the said Order of the 29th of last Month contained to the contrary notwithstanding. Whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

The King has been pleased to order a Congé d'Elire to the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Carlisle, empowering them to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being void by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God John, late Bishop thereof, to the See of Salisbury; and His Majesty has also been pleased, by His Royal Sign Manual, to recommend to the said Dean and Chapter the Reverend Edward Venables Vernon, Doctor of Laws, to be by them elected Bishop of the said See of Carlisle.

The King has been pleased to grant to the Right Reverend Father in God Doctor James Cornwallis, Bishop of Lichfield and Coventry, the Deanry of His Majesty's Chapel Royal in the Castle of Windsor, with the Deanry of Wolverhampton and Regiſtry of the Knights of the Most Noble Order of the Garter thereunto annexed, in the Room of the Right Reverend Doctor John Douglas, now Bishop of Salisbury.

HIGH COURT OF ADMIRALTY.

NOTICE is given to all Merchants, Owners, Freighters, Masters of Ships, and Mariners, and to all other Persons whom it may concern, that, it having been represented to the Judge of the said Court, that the Arrest of Ships and Masters, upon the Suggestion of Wages being due to Mariners, at the Moment when Ships, having taken in their Cargoes, are ready to set sail for their respective Markets, is liable to cause great Loss and Injury to the Merchants, Owners, Freighters and Masters, by Reason of the Delay and Detention of such Ships, their Commanders and Cargoes, in Ports at a Distance from the Metropolis, until such Time as a Commission under Seal for the taking of Bail, and a Superſedeas can be obtained from the said High Court of Admiralty, Sir James Marriott, Knight, Doctor of Laws, Lieutenant of the said High Court of Admiralty, Official Principal, and Commissary General and Special, President and Judge thereof, hath decreed Commissions to pass under the Great Seal of the said Court, in His Majesty's Name, to the several Persons hereinafter mentioned, jointly and severally, to take Bail or Caution, with sufficient Sureties approved by them upon diligent Enquiry, to the Amount of the Action specified in the Warrant, and to grant Superſedeas of Warrants and Arrests of Ships and Masters in the following Out-Ports of this Kingdom, agreeably to the Form of the Bail annexed to the said Commissions, and the Instructions therein contained, returnable, with all convenient and reasonable Speed, to His Majesty, in His High Court of Admiralty, the Judge, or his Surrogate, duly attested.

Constantinople, July 8.

The Plague is now spread to every Part of this City. In the Villages situated on the Canal the Mortality continues moderate; the Franc Houses are, however, shut up, as in Times of the greatest Calamity. The Contagion continued at Smyrna on the 1st Instant, and has broken out with Violence at Adrianople, through which City it is important to observe, the new Levies pass daily, on their March to the Frontiers.

Constantinople, July 14.

The Plague continues here with little Variation; but is much increased at Adrianople, and other Places of Romelia.

Stockholm, August 5.

The King of Sweden arrived here the 3d Instant, in the Morning, in perfect Health.
