WHEREAS the Parliament of this Kingdom stands prorogued to Tuesday the Sixth Day of September instant: We do publish and declare, that the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is, hereby further prorogued to Tuesday the Fifteenth Day of November next, 1791: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament, are to take Notice accordingly.

GOD Save the KING.

Vienna, August 22.

A Russian Officer, dispatched by Prince Repnin from his Head Quarters, arrived here Yesterday with an official Account to the Russian Ambassador, that Peace had been concluded between the Czarina and the Porte at Galacz on the 11th Instant.

Dresden, August 28.

His Imperial Majesty, accompanied by the Arch-Duke Francis, arrived at Poelnitz, the Elector's Summer Residence in the Neighbourhood of this Capital, between Eleven and Twelve in the Morning of the 25th. The King and Prince Royal of Prussia arrived about an Hour later. The same Evening the Count d'Artois arrived in Dresden, and the next Morning His Royal Highness was invited to Poelnitz,

where Apartments were provided for him. The 26th there was an Opera, Supper and Firework at Poelnitz, to which the principal Nobility and Foreign Ministers were invited. Yesterday a Masked Ball was given to the Public at the great Opera House in this City, at which these illustrious Visitors and the Electoral Family were present. Early this Morning His Imperial Majesty and the Arch-Duke set out for Prague. The King of Prussia and the Prince Royal are gone to Moritzburg, one of the Elector's Country Palaces, where they are to hunt and dine, and will afterwards continue their Route to Potzdam. The Count d'Artois will set out this Evening on his Return to Coblentz. His Imperial Majesty was attended by Marshal Lascy and M. de Spielman; the King of Prussia, by Prince Hohenloe, General Bischoffswerder, and M. de Manstein. In the Suite of the Count d'Artois were M. de Calonne, M. d'Escars, M. d'Estehazy, and Baron Roll. The Prince of Nassau Siegen, the Marquis de Bouillé, and the Duke de Polignac met His Royal Highness here.

Berlin, September 2.

The King of Prussia arrived, from Poelnitz, on the 28th Ultimo, at Potzdam.

Whitehall, September 8, 1791.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, that on the 25th of August last, Thomas Hall, Surveyor of the Customs at the Islands of Scilly, having received Information of a Smuggling Vessel called the Friendship, of Penzance, belonging to James Dunkin, and commanded by George Branwell, went out in his Boat in Search of her, and about Ten o'Clock at Night fell in with her in old Grimby Harbour, near the Island of Treisco; and that on his rowing toward the said Vessel for the Purpose of boarding her, a Person from the Deck hailed, and asked, "What Boat is that?" and upon the said Hall's answering, "The Custom Boat," Two Muskets or Blunderbusses were immediately fired by the said James Dunkin into the said Boat, by which William Millett and John Oliver, Two of the Boatmen in the said Custom-House Boat, were killed, and John Jane, another of the Boatmen, dangerously wounded: And whereas the Coroner's Inquest having sat on the Bodies
