A PROCLAMATION:
GEORGE R.

WHEREAS certain evil-minded Persons did, on the Morning of the Twenty-eighth Day of July last, set Fire to the Out-Houses of Mr. James Wheat, of Norwood-Hall, in Our County of York; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish and declare Our Resolution that the Authors, Abettors and Perpetrators of the said Offence be prosecuted as speedily as may be, according to the due Course of Law: And We do hereby enjoin and require all Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Mayors, Bailiffs, Constables, and all Our loving Subjects, to be aiding and assisting, to the utmost of their Power, in detecting, apprehending and bringing to Justice the said Offenders: And We are graciously pleased to promise, that if any Person shall discover any other Person or Persons who were guilty of the said Offence, so as the Person or Persons discovered may be prosecuted for the same, such Discoverer shall have as a Reward **ONE HUNDRED POUNDS** for each and every such Offender, and also Our gracious Pardon for the said Offence, in case the Person making such Discovery shall himself be liable to be prosecuted for the same.

Given at Our Court at Weymouth, the Twenty-eighth Day of September, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-one, in the Thirty-first Year of Our Reign.

THE Letters from the East Indies, of which the following are Copy and Extract, were both received on the 5th Instant, the former by the Eliza, a Danish Ship, and the latter by the Warren Hastings, one of the Company's Ships.

To the Honorable the Secret Committee of the Court of Directors for Affairs of the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies:

HONORABLE SIRS,

SINCE our Dispatches, which were forwarded on the Worcester Indiaman, under Date of the 23d of March, we have received Accounts of the further Operations of Lord Cornwallis's Army, and take the Opportunity of the Danish Ship Eliza, touching at this Port for a few Hours, and bound for Europe, to communicate to you the Particulars.

On the 5th Ultimo the Grand Army arrived at the strong Fort of Bangalore, without meeting any Opposition from the Enemy in ascending the Ghauts, or on their subsequent March to this Place. His Lordship immediately laid Siege to this important Fort, and on the 13th of March carried the Pettah by Storm. During the Attack Lieutenant-Colonel Moorhouse, of the Artillery on your Madras Establishment, and Captain Delaney, of His Majesty's 36th Regiment, were killed, with some few Private Europeans and Sepoys. The next Day Tippoo's Army appeared in Sight, and he made Two separate Attempts to drive the British Troops from this Station, and was repulsed in each with very great Slaughter. On the 22d the Breach, though scarcely practicable, Lord Cornwallis determined, without further Delay, to storm the Fort, as he was beginning to run short of Provisions. The Storming Party consisted of the 36th, 72d, 76th, King's Regiments, Two Battalions of Sepoys, together with the European Grenadiers and Light Infantry of the Army; and the Whole commanded by Major-General Meadows.



Medows. They were obliged to descend and ascend the Ditch with Scaling Ladders; and in Two Hours from the Commencement of the Assault the British Colors were seen flying on the Rampart. The Garrison consisted of about 3000 Men; 1500 of whom were almost instantly and inevitably put to the Bayonet. Among the Killed was the Killedar, an old Man, and nearly related to the Sultan. Great Quantities of Grain, we understand, were found in the Fort and Pettah; and, we are happy to add, that this glorious Enterprize was effected with the Loss only of about 20 Men killed and wounded on our Side. Bangalore is reckoned among Tippoo's strongest Holds in the Mysore Country, and consequently its Loss must be severely felt by him.

We beg Leave further to offer our Congratulations on the Success of your Arms at Darwar, which, after an unexpectedly long Siege, capitulated to the English, in Conjunction with the Marratta Arms, on the 5th Instant. We have not yet received the Particulars of the Surrender; and can only acquaint you, that Colonel Frederick, of our Bombay Establishment, died before the Place, after a short Illness, when in Command of the Detachment; from which Period it devolved to Major Sartorius, of your Engineer Corps.

General Abercromby's Army is still in the same Station as when we last had the Honor of addressing you, where he still purposes to remain until the nearer Approach of Lord Cornwallis; but as the rainy Season on this Side of India is now near at Hand, General Abercromby will be under the Necessity of cantoning the Troops, so as to form a Chain of Communication between this Place and the Coorja Ghaut, which leads into the Mysore Dominions. He proposes strengthening Bombay with One Regiment of Europeans, who will go up in your Ship the Queen, Captain Douglas, about the End of this Month; and Bombay, we apprehend, will be further strengthened by such Part of the Darwar Detachment as can be spared from garrisoning that Place.

Extract of a Letter from the Governor and Council at Madras, in their Political Department, to the Court of Directors of the East India Company, dated April 29, 1791.

WE have great Pleasure in acquainting you, that on the 23d Instant we received Advice from the Resident at Poona that the Fort of Darwar had surrendered to Major Sartorius on the 3d of that Month; and by Letters from the Resident at Hyderabad we learn, that the Killedar of Copul was in Treaty for the Delivery of that Fort to the Nizam's General.

Lord Cornwallis having effected his Junction with Lieutenant-Colonel Oldham's Detachment, moved on the 22d Instant from Venketegherry in the Direction of Bangalore.

Saturday last being the Feast of St. Alexander, and the Name-day of His Imperial Highness the Great Duke Alexander, the same was observed at Court in the usual Manner, and in the Evening there was a Ball and Illuminations.

Whitehall, October 5, 1791.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, That on Tuesday the 16th of August last, the Dolphin Revenue Cutter, Richard John Commander, stationed at the Port of St. Ives, fell in with a large armed Smuggling Lugger near Padstow, in the County of Cornwall, when the Smugglers feloniously fired a Shot at the Dolphin, brought her to, and immediately ordered Mr. Ormond, the Mate of the Cutter, on Board, who found her navigated with about Fifty Men, all armed ready for Action, having Eight Six-Pounders mounted, with as many more in the Hold, and pierced for Eighteen Guns:

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in this Felony and Outrage, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any One or more of the said Offenders, who shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, (except the Master or Commander of the said Lugger, or the Person who actually fired) so that One or more of them may be apprehended and convicted of the said Offence.

MAIL ROBBERY and MURDER.

ON Thursday the 15th Instant, about Five o'Clock in the Morning, James Hogaworth, the Post-Boy, carrying the Mail from Warrington to Manchester, was murdered about a Mile from Warrington: The Mail was found open, and the Letters in the following Bags were taken out and carried away, viz. the Bags from Chester for Manchester and Rochdale, which contained the Letters of the 10th from Ireland for those Towns and Places beyond, and the Bags from Liverpool and Warrington for Rochdale.

Two Men (supposed from their Accent to be Irishmen) were seen near the Place where the Robbery and Murder was committed immediately afterwards, and were, about Six o'Clock the same Morning, seen a Mile and a Half from Warrington on the Road to Liverpool. They were about Five Feet Five Inches

high; one dressed in a strait-bodied ash-coloured Coat, the other in a striped Great Coat, with a large Cape, and each carried a small Bundle.

Whoever shall apprehend and convict, or cause to be apprehended and convicted, the Person or Persons who committed this Robbery and Murder, will be entitled to a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, over and above the Reward given by Act of Parliament for apprehending of Highwaymen; or if any Person or Persons, whether an Accomplice in the Robbery and Murder, (except the Person or Persons who actually committed the Murder) shall make Discovery, whereby the Person or Persons who committed the same, may be apprehended and brought to Justice, such Discoverer will, upon Conviction of the Party or Parties, be entitled to the same Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS, and will also receive His Majesty's most gracious Pardon.
