## WESTMORLAND.

WHEREAS His Majesty hath signified unto us His Royal Pleasure, that the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now stands prorogued to Tuesday the 15th Day of November instant, be further prorogued to Thursday the 19th Day of January next, 1792, then to be held at Dublin, and fit for the Dispatch of Business: We do therefore publish and declare that the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is, hereby further prorogued to Thursday the 19th Day of January next, 1792, and the same shall be then held at Dublin, and fit for the Dispatch of Business: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament, are to take Notice, and give their Attendance accordingly.

GOD Save the KING.

Whitehall, November 11, 1791.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that, upon the 20th of October last, as His Majesty's Excise Cutter the *Badger*, was cruising between *Black Combe* and the *Isle of Man*, she fell in with a large Smuggling Luggier, when a warm Engagement ensued between the *Badger* and the said Luggier, wherein Mr. Daniel Stewart, the Master Surveyor, was shot through the Shoulder, Richard Martley, the Cook, through the Legs, and others of the Crew slightly wounded; and after the said Luggier, from her superior Force, had driven the *Badger's* People from their Guns and Decks, and had prevented their Escape by keeping up a constant Fire upon her, and disabled her Mast and Rigging, she hailed the *Badger*, and ordered her to send the Boat on Board the Luggier, or that they would sink the Cutter; and the Boat being accordingly sent, she soon returned to the *Badger* with Six or Eight of the Luggier's People in her, who sent Mr. Inglis, Mate of the *Badger*, and Three of her Men, on Board the Luggier, and then cut away the *Badger's* Mast, and cut her Sail from the Yards, threw her Great Guns and Small Arms over-board, and plundered the *Badger* of her Stores, and the Master Surveyor and Mate of their Cloaths, Watches, Money, and other their private Property, with all which they returned to the said Luggier, and then gave the Mate and People of the *Badger* (whom they had before sent on Board her) their Choice

of being thrown over-board, or going again in the small Boat to the *Badger*, which, from a heavy Gale of Wind that had then come on, there was little Probability of their reaching, but they providentially effected it, and the *Badger* is since returned a perfect Wreck to the *Isle of Man*:

His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the above daring Acts of Violence and Piracy, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to such of them as may give Information against one or more of their Accomplices, except the Master and Mate of the said Luggier, and excepting all those Persons who actually went in the Luggier's Boat on Board the *Badger* and plundered her as aforesaid, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And the Commissioners of Excise, in lieu of the Reward offered by them in the London Gazette of the 12th Instant, (which Offer they hereby revoke) do now offer a Reward of FIVE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons who shall discover or apprehend the Master of the said Luggier; and also a Reward of THREE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons who shall discover or apprehend the Mate of the said Luggier; and also a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons who shall discover or apprehend any one or more of the Crew of the said Luggier that actually went on board of and plundered the *Badger*; and a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person or Persons who shall discover or apprehend any one or more of the Remainder of the Crew of the said Luggier; the said respective Rewards to be paid by their Secretary on Conviction of the Offenders respectively.
