This Day the Right Honourable the Lord Mayor and Sheriffs, attended by the Recorder and the City Remembrancer, waited upon the Queen (being introduced by the Earl of Ailesbury, Lord Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household) with the following Address, which was read by the Recorder.

To the QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen and Commons of the City of London, in Common Council assembled, highly sensible of your Majesty's Maternal Regard for the Welfare and Prosperity of these Kingdoms, humbly approach your Majesty with our most unfeigned Congratulations upon the marriage of His Royal Highness the Duke of York with the Princess Royal of Prussia.

The Prospect of domestic Happiness to your Majesty from this Event affords the utmost Satisfaction to His Majesty's Subjects, who have so long experienced, and with one Voice acknowledged your transcendent Virtues.

The Citizens of London besetech your Majesty to accept their sincerest Wishes that His Majesty's Reign may be greatly prolonged and blessed with the most perfect Happiness of your Majesty and His Illustrious House, and the firmest Loyalty of a brave and happy People.

The King has been pleased to grant to George Forester, of Elmly Lovatt in the County of Worcester, Esq; His Royal Licence and Authority to assume, take and use the Name of Townsend between his Christian and Surname, pursuant to the last Will and Testament of his Grandfather Robert Townsend, late of Christleton in the County of Chester, Esq; deceased:

The King has also been pleased to grant to Trafford Leigh, of the Inner Temple, London, and of Over Darwen, in the County Palatine of Lancaster, Esq; and his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to assume and take the Surname and bear the Arms of Trafford only, in Compliance with the last Will of his Maternal Uncle, Richard Trafford, of Over Darwen aforesaid, Esq; deceased; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office:

And also to order, that these His Majesty's Concessions and Declarations be registered in His College of Arms.
