Berlin, January 3.

The King of Great Britain having been graciously pleased to nominate Merton Eden, Esq; his Envoy-Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary at this Court, to be a Knight Companion of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath; and His Majesty being desirous that he should be knighted and invested with the Ensigns of the Order in the most distinguished Manner, Mr. Eden presented a Letter from the King his Master, requesting that His Prussian Majesty would be pleased to represent His Britannick Majesty on this Occasion. His Prussian Majesty consented with the utmost Readiness, and with many cordial Professions of Friendship towards His Britannick Majesty, and appointed Sunday the 1st Instant, at Eleven o'Clock, for the Ceremony.

Mr. Eden repaired to the Palace at the Hour appointed, and was received by Count Finckenstein, one of the Ministers for Foreign Affairs, and the Great Chamberlain, Prince Sacken. Soon after the folding Doors of the Audience Chamber were thrown open, and Mr. Eden was introduced by Count Finckenstein. His Majesty was standing under the Canopy of State; on his Right Hand stood the Prince Royal of Prussia, and Two of his Brothers, and also His Majesty's Uncle, Prince Ferdinand, with his Two Sons; on the Left were the Chief Officers of State and of the Household, and General Mollendorff, Governor of Berlin, with some of the principal General Officers. Mr. Eden approached His Majesty with Three Bows, and turning to the Prince Royal and the other Princes, made them likewise a respectful Bow. The King then addressed Mr. Eden, and told him, that, at the Request and in the Name of his
