The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

**W**HEREAS by an Act passed in the Twentieth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies," it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorize, or by Warrant or Warrants, under His Sign Manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland for the Time being to authorize, in Case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the then ensuing Season only; provided always, that such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorized to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported except in

conformity to such Rules, Regulations and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants, respectively, and except by British Subjects and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law. And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn; His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, That, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour and Indian Corn be imported into the said Island from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which shall, within the Space of Seven Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from some Port in Great Britain, or some other Port of His Majesty's Dominions in Europe, for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom respectively, in the

the Manner and Form herein after mentioned ; which Licences shall continue and be in Force for Seven Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which they are respectively granted, and no longer ; provided that no such Licence as aforefaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of June, One Thousand Seven Hundred and Ninety-two, shall be of any Force or Effect : And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, That the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour or Place in the Island of Newfoundland where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned. And the Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, of his having received the said Licence, so indorsed as before directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom such Licence was granted.

His Majesty's British Subjects; and that no Foreigner, directly or indirectly, hath any Share, Part, or Interest therein.

Now be it known that the said [Person's Name] hath Licence to lade on board the said Ship [Ship's Name], at and from any Port or Place belonging to the United States of America, Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn, the Produce of the said United States; and no other Article whatsoever, and to carry the said Bread, Flour, and Indian Corn to some Port or Place on the Island of Newfoundland; and on the Arrival of the said Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master, or Person having the Charge or Command of the said Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to indorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, or Indian Corn, and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the said Collector or other proper Officer of the Customs.

**T**HIS Day the Parliament having met, according to Prorogation, his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant went in State to the House of Peers, and being seated on the Throne with the usual Solemnity, Mr. Bryan Connor, Yeoman Usher of the Black Rod, was sent with a Message from his Excellency to the House of Commons, signifying his Pleasure that they should immediately attend his Excellency in the House of Peers: The Commons being come thither accordingly, his Excellency made the following Speech:

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

**I** HAVE it in Command from His Majesty to acquaint you, that, since the Close of the last Session, Preliminaries of Peace have been signed between Russia and the Porte, and those Powers are now engaged in Negotiation for a Definitive Treaty, which, His Majesty trusts, will complete the Restoration of Tranquillity amongst the different Powers of Europe.

His Majesty, convinced of the Interest you take in whatever concerns his domestic Happiness, commands me to acquaint you of the Marriage of His Royal Highness the Duke of York and the Princess Royal of Prussia.

*Gentlemen of the House of Commons,*

I have ordered the proper Officers to lay before you the National Accounts, and I trust you will make such Provisions as are necessary for the Exigencies of the State, and the honourable Support of His Majesty's Government.

*My Lords, and Gentlemen,*

The constant Attention you have shewn to the Interests of Ireland makes it unnecessary to recommend to you a Continuance of that wise System of Policy, from which your Country has received such inestimable Advantages, in the Increase of her Trade, her Credit, and Manufactures. It is equally unnecessary for me particularly to point out the Encouragement of your Agriculture, and Attention to your Linen Manufacture. The Protestant Charter Schools, and other charitable Institutions, will receive your accustomed Consideration.

*Yea*

You may be assured of my zealous Co-operation, to forward every Measure that may contribute to the Public Welfare. I shall pay unremitting Attention to the due Execution of the Law, and the Maintenance of good Order and Government, so essential to the Continuance of that Freedom, Prosperity, and Happiness, which Ireland enjoys under His Majesty's auspicious Reign, and under our excellent Constitution.
