offa Peace, the more earnest in their instances to the Emperor, to procure likewife a Peace for the Empire; and, as we are told, the Elector Palatine, and the Electors of Bayaria and Saxony, are particularly zealous to advance this great work, which they look upon to be of so great importance to the Empire. The City of Trasbutg, though it suffers very much by the present interruption of their Commerce, yet hath refused the Overtures which have been lately made on the part of the Mareichal de Crequi for the re-establishing the former friendthip between them. The Mareichal de Crequi is encamped at Minfelden, having put Garisons juto Lauterburg, Croon-Wey [enburg, and Rhyn-zaberne. The Is instant the Mareichal de crequisent out 300 Horse towards Landau, who obliged 400 Imperial Horse to retire from thence, and to leave the place open to them.

Cologue, Sept. 20. It is not to be wondred that these parts rejoice at the news thy have from Nimeguen, that the Peace is Signed between France and Spain, since the confequence of it is of so much advantage to them, by the felliption of Macstricht to the Dutch, which will put an end to the ravages and dev. stations the Country of Fuliers, and Merg, and even this Diocess, have been solong exposed to from the Gaisson of Macstricht. From above our advices tell us, that the Palatinate suffers extreamly by the neighborhood of the Imperial Army, their Foragers plundering the Country whereever they same; that the Duke of Lorsin had commanded his Infantry to pass the Rhine, and to join the Body commanded by Contrage.

Nimeguan, Sept. 21. In our last we gave you an account that the Treaty of Peace between France and Spain was Signed on Saturday lath, which was come arathe Hous, of the Dutch Amballadors, where a Room was prepared for that purpose, with two Doors! What we have now to tell you is, that yellerday about three in the afternoon, a Courier arrived here from the Hague, and brought the States Ratification of their late Treaty with France, which was yet that evening exchanged with that of France, which hath lay'n ready a long while; which done, the Ambassadors complimented each other f and this day they will have Bonfires torc. We are told that all the parties from willing to agree to the Cellation of Arms which is proposed, only the Suedes make some difficulty, which they must expect the Orders of the King their Master We are told that the Bishop of Munker died on Monday last, about 8 in the morning, and that the indix day his Corps was carried to Munster, he having died at one of his Housesin the Country.

Nimeguen, and the Ratifications of that between that Crown and this State exchanged. people here are full of joy, and when the Peace comes to be published, which will be in few days, will expressit by Bonfires, Rireworks, Sic, for which they begin already to make preparation furthiough we are pleased, there are others that are first, for the Letters from the Northern quatters, say, that the Allies on that fide are very march to mean that they feem refolved to continue the War.

Hague 3 Sept. 25. On Monday last the Ratifications of the Treaty of Prace, Signed the 10th past

at Nimeques by the Ambaffadors of France, and those of this State, were exchang d, and on Wednesday those of France were brought hither by an Express dispatched by our Ambassadors. On Wednesday next the Peace will be published here as likewise at Paris; and the same day Monsieur & Avanx Ambaffador from the Molt Christian King to this State. will make his publick Entry into this place, and the evening will be spent with Bonfires, Feastings, &c, initable to the occasion; but the great Solemnity will not be till the th of Odober, which is the Monthly Fast-day that has been observed since the War, but is now to be turned into a Thanksgiving for the Peace, and then there will be rare Fireworks, and a great Entertainment made at the tharge of the State. The Ambassadors which the States are sending, being sour in number, to France, will part hence in a day or two, their Dispatches being, as we are told, already finished. My Lord Ambassador Hyde, and the Earl of Offory, General of the English Forces in the service of this State, parted hence some days since in their return for England, where the wind having been pretty fair, it's believed they are arrived by this time. The Co-vernment of Hertogenbasch, vacant by the death of Colonel Kilgarricke, is given to the Count de Nassau, General of the Cavalry of this State. From Swol we have an account, that the Rithop of Munster died on Monday laft.

Paris, Sapt. 24. The 2p inflant arrived here two Couriers from Nimeguen, one of which went for Spain, by whom we had the knowl dge that the Peace was Signed the 17 inliant at night by the Amballadors of this Crown and of Spain, our King having absolutely quitted the several Points which remained in difference, and particularly that concerning the comprehending the Messinel's that are retired into this Kingdom and yesterday the Peace was published at Fontametleau by one of the Kings Heralds at Arms. Our last Letters from our Army in Alfaes, give us nothing new, the two Armies continuing to ruine the Country on both fides the Rbine, without that any confiderable action passed between them. From Messina we have advice, that the Prince de Gonzague treated those that were lookt upon to be well affected to the French with some severity, and that he had obliged above 200 persons as wellReligious, as others, to depart the City.
