The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

7HEREAS the Names of many of the Officers ferving in the respective Regiments and Battalions of Militia within the feveral Counties in England and Wales have been fréquently returned by the Judges in the List of Persons proper to be appointed Sheriffs, notwithstanding such Officers are by Law exempted from ferving the Office of Sheriff during the Time of their Service in the Militia: And whereas the Impropriety of fuch Returns may have proceeded from the Want of Information being given to the Judges of the Names of the several Officers fo ferving in the Militia, from whence many Inconveniencies have arisen; His Majesty, in order to prevent the like happening for the future, is pleased, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby to require and command that the respective Lieutenants of the several Counties in England and Wales, where the Militia has been raised and embodied, do cause Lists to be made every Year of the Names and Places of Residence of the Officers ferving in the Militia within their respective Counties, and cause the said Lists to be delivered into the Hands of the Clerk of the Assize, in order to be laid before the Judges at the Time of holding the Summer Affize; that Care may be taken, for the Time to come, that the Names of any fuch Officers

be not inferted on the Roll of Persons to be proposed. to His Majesty as proper to serve the Office of Sheriff.

Yesterday having been appointed for the Celebra-tion of Her Majesty's Birth-Day, there was a nume-rous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction to compliment his Excellency the Lord Lieutenant, before whom an Ode set to Music was performed. o'Clock the Great Guns at the Salute Battery in His Majesty's Park the Phoenix were fired Three Rounds, and answered by Vollies from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn up in the Royal Square at the Barracks. In the Evening a Play was given by his Excellency to the Ladies; and at Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and other Demonstrations of Joy throughout the City.

did, on the Twenty-fifth Day of the faid Month of February, report to the House, That it appeared to the said Scient Committee, that the Merits of the Petitions did in Part depend upon the Right of Election. The Parties were therefore required to deliver in Statements in Writing of the Right of Election for which they respectively contended. That the Sitting Members, Benjamin Lester, Esquire, and the Honourable Charles Stuart, delivered in a Statement as follows: "The " Sitting Members contend, that the Right of Elec-" tion for Members to serve in Parliament for the "Town and County of Poole is in the Mayor and Burgesses only." That upon the Statement delivered in by the Petitioners Lord Haddo and Lord Daer the faid Select Committee have determined, "That the Right of Election, as fet forth in the " faid Statement, is not the Right of Election for the faid Town and County of Poole." That upon the Statements delivered in by Michael Angelo Taylor and Robert Kingsmill, Esquires, and the Sitting Members, the faid Select Committee have determined, "That the Right of Election for Members " to ferve in Parliament for the Town and County of Poole is in the Mayor and Burgesses only. That the Petitioners are advised, and humbly infift, that the Right, which hath been deemed valid in the Judgment of the faid Select Committee, is not the ancient and true Right of Election for the faid Borough and County, or the faid Town and County of Poole: The Petitioners, therefore, most humbly pray the House that they may be admitted as Parties to oppose the Right of Election which hath been deemed valid in the Judgment of the faid Select Committee, and that they may have fuch further and other Relief in the Premises as to the House shall seem meet, and the Nature of the Case may require. I do hereby give Notice, that the House has appointed Friday the Twentieth Day of April next, at Three of the Clock in the Afternoon, to take the faid Petition into Confideration.
