Robert and John Grimshaw, Merchants, of Manchester aforesaid:

"Sirs,

"We have sworn together to destroy your Factory if we dye for it and to have your Lives for ruining our Trade and if you go on you know the Certainty which comes unknown to my Companions."

That on the Night of Thursday last, the 15th Day of March instant, the Weaving Factory of the said Messrs. Robert and John Grimshaw, situated at Knot Mill, in Manchester aforesaid, was destroyed by Fire, and that there is Reason to suspect that the said Premises were wilfully and maliciously set on Fire by some Person or Persons unknown.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in writing and sending the Letter above-mentioned, and in setting Fire to the said Premises, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in both or either of the Offences within mentioned (except the Person who actually wrote the said Letter, or set Fire to the said Premises) so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

"You are Anopolisir you have a deal of Ware-houses full of Cotton if you dont lesen the Prices very much in next week they shall all of them be in flames depend on it since we have begun our design we intend to carry it on and have less proud Devils in the town that impoverith us so ill by keeping up the prices of Cotton Wool your life shall go also depend upon it with 4 others we intend—A Weaver. P. S. if we are hanged for you we will be better off than as we are"
