Whitehall, May 15.

THE King has been pleased to grant the Dignities of Viscount and Earl of the Kingdom of Great Britain to the Right Honorable Joseph Lord Milton, and the Heir's Male of his Body lawfully begotten, by the Name, Style and Title of Viscount Milton, of Milton Abbey, and Earl of Dorchester, both in the County of Dorset.

The Lord Chancellor has appointed Thomas Keating, of Liverpool, in the County of Lancaster, Gentleman, to be a Master Extraordinary in the High Court of Chancery.

Commission in the Western Battalion of the Essex Militia, signed by His Majesty.

Captain-Lieutenant and Captain George Williamson, from the 70th (or the Surrey) Regiment of Foot, is appointed Adjutant, vice Smyth, resigned. Dated May 10, 1792.

Commission in the Lancaster Militia, signed by the Lord Lieutenant.

Edward Wilbraham Bootle, of Latham House, in the County Palatine of Lancaster, Esq; to be a Captain. Dated March 22, 1792.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that in several successive Days in the Beginning of this Month, a Number of incendiary Letters, threatening the Lives and Properties of the Provost, and several of the Magistrates and Councillors of the Burgh of Lanark, in the County of Lanark, have been dropped in the Streets of the said Burgh, by some evil-disposed Person or Persons unknown: That a valuable Orchard belonging to the said Provost has been totally destroyed: That, on the Night of Friday the 4th Instant, One or

Two Guns or Pistols, loaded with Balls, were discharged at the Window of the said Provost's House, into the Room where he was then actually sitting, Two of which pierced the Window Shutter, and passed very near him:

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the above violent Outrages, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his, her or their Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

AT the Lent Assizes, 1792, for the County of Cambridge, an Indictment was found by the Grand Jury against Spence Broughton and John Oxley for robbing the Cambridge Mail, near Bourn Bridge, on the 9th of June last; and at the same Assizes for the County of York an Indictment was likewise found against them for robbing the Mail between Sheffield and Rothcran on the 29th of January, 1791; on which last Indictment Broughton was tried and convicted.

Oxley escaped out of Clerkenwell Bridewell on the 31st of October last.

He is about Twenty-five Years of Age, Five Feet Ten Inches high, pale faced, rather pitted with the Small Pox, and his Nose turned a little to the Right.

Whoever shall secure the said John Oxley, and lodge him in any of the Goals of this Kingdom, within Three Months from the Date hereof, will be entitled to a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be paid immediately on his Commitment.
