A PROCLAMATION.
GEORGE R:

WHEREAS divers wicked and seditious Writings have been printed, published, and industriously dispersed, tending to excite Tumult and Disorder, by endeavouring to raise groundless Jealousies and Discontents in the Minds of Our faithful and loving Subjects, respecting the Laws and happy Constitution of Government, Civil and Religious, established in this Kingdom; and endeavouring to vilify and bring into Contempt the wise and wholesome Provisions made at the Time of the Glorious Revolution, and since strengthened and confirmed by subsequent Laws for the Preservation and Security of the Rights and Liberties of Our faithful and loving Subjects: And whereas divers Writings have also been printed, published and industriously dispersed, recommending the said wicked and seditious Publications to the Attention of all Our faithful and loving Subjects: And whereas we have also Reason to believe that Correspondencies have been entered into with sundry Persons in Foreign Parts, with a View to forward the criminal and wicked Purposes above mentioned. And whereas the Wealth, Happiness and Prosperity of this Kingdom do, under Divine Providence, chiefly depend upon a due Submission to the Laws, a just Confidence in the Integrity and Wisdom of Parliament, and a Continuance of that zealous Attachment to the Government and Constitution of the

Kingdom, which has ever prevailed in the Minds of the People thereof: And whereas there is nothing which We so earnestly desire as to secure the Publick Peace and Prosperity, and to preserve to all Our loving Subjects the full Enjoyment of their Rights and Liberties, both Religious and Civil: We, therefore, being resolved, as far as in Us lies, to repress the wicked and seditious Practices aforesaid, and to deter all Persons from following so pernicious an Example, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, solemnly warning all Our loving Subjects, as they tender their own Happiness, and that of their Posterity, to guard against all such Attempts, which aim at the Subversion of all regular Government within this Kingdom, and which are inconsistent with the Peace and Order of Society; and earnestly exhorting them at all Times, and to the utmost of their Power, to avoid and discourage all Proceedings, tending to produce Riots and Tumults; and We do strictly charge and command all Our Magistrates in and throughout Our Kingdom of Great Britain, that they do make diligent Enquiry, in order to discover the Authors and Printers of such wicked and seditious Writings as aforesaid, and all others who shall disperse the same: And We do further charge and command all Our Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, chief Magistrates in Our Cities, Boroughs and Corporations, and all other Our Officers and Magistrates throughout Our Kingdom of Great Britain, that they do, in their several and respective Stations,

take the most immediate and effectual Care to suppress and prevent all Riots, Tumults and other Disorders, which may be attempted to be raised or made by any Person or Persons, which, on whatever Pretext they may be grounded, are not only contrary to Law, but dangerous to the most important Interests of this Kingdom: And We do further require and command all and every Our Magistrates aforesaid, that they do, from Time to Time, transmit to One of Our Principal Secretaries of State, due and full Information of such Persons as shall be found offending as aforesaid, or in any Degree aiding or abetting therein; it being Our Determination, for the Preservation of the Peace and Happiness of Our faithful and loving Subjects, to carry the Laws vigorously into Execution against such Offenders as aforesaid.

Given at Our Court at the Queen's House, the Twenty-first Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, in the Thirty-second Year of Our Reign.

The King has been pleased to appoint the Right Honorable Lord Macartney to be His Majesty's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the Emperor of China.

The King has also been pleased to appoint Sir George Leonard Staunton, Baronet, to be His Majesty's Secretary of Embassy to the Emperor of China.

The King has been pleased to grant to the Reverend Charles Morgan, Master of Arts, Rector of Loughgilly, in the County of Armagh, and Dean of St. Patrick's Cathedral, Ardagh, in the Kingdom of Ireland, and his Issue, His Royal Licence and Authority to assume and take the Surname of Warburton only, in pursuance of the Desire of his maternal Cousin-German, Mrs. Alicia Warburton, Spinster, Sister of the late William Warburton, of the City of London, Esq; deceased; and also to order that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.

May it please your Majesty,

THE most gracious Letter with which your Majesty has been pleased to honour this General Assembly of the Church of Scotland was received with that Respect and Gratitude which are due for

so signal a Mark of your Royal Condescension and Favour.

We offer our most sincere and humble Acknowledgements for the Confidence your Majesty has been pleased to repose in our Loyalty and Affection to your Person and Government, and in our Zeal for the Encouragement of true Religion and Virtue. We beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that we come together at present possessed of the same Dispositions and Principles which have regulated our Conduct on former Occasions. While we regard the Approbation of our Sovereign as a most agreeable Recompence for our past Services, we trust that the Hope of being again honoured with it, will animate us to a steady Perseverance in our Endeavours to promote the Happiness of your Reign, and the true Interests of the Church of which we are Members.

That your Majesty continues to countenance our Meetings with your Royal Authority, we consider as a most satisfactory Proof of your paternal Goodness; and we rely with the most perfect Security on your fixed Determination to maintain the Church of Scotland in the perfect Enjoyment of all its just Rights and Privileges:

Assembled for the Advancement of true Religion and the Service of Almighty God, we shall apply ourselves with Temper and Moderation to promote these good Ends. We shall endeavour to avoid all unnecessary Debates and Contentions, as not more displeasing to your Majesty than dishonourable to ourselves, and inconsistent with the Wisdom that is from Above; and we shall bear in Mind the special Obligations we are laid under, to direct all our Deliberations to the Means of checking the Growth of Vice and Impiety, of promoting the Practice of all Christian Duties, and of keeping alive, among all Ranks of Men committed to our Charge, that Respect and Regard for the Clergy, and that Deference and Subordination to the Magistracy, which are essential to the Peace and good Order of any Society, which must always be conducive to the Happiness and Prosperity of this Kingdom, and which invariably mark the Character of the Followers of the Prince of Peace.

In our several Stations we shall use our best Endeavours to impress upon the Minds of your Majesty's Subjects a just Sense of the many important Blessings they at present enjoy under the Favour of Providence; and we shall strenuously inculcate upon them, that by manifesting a Spirit of Devotion, a Respect for the Laws, and an Attention to the various Duties of our holy Religion, they will most suitably express their Gratitude to that God who hath dealt so bountifully with them, and take the most effectual Method to ensure a Continuance of His Blessing and Protection.

We rejoice in the renewed Expression of your Majesty's Zeal for the Propagation of the reformed Protestant Religion in the Highlands and Islands of Scotland; and it shall be our Care, by a faithful Application of the Sum your Majesty hath graciously bestowed, to fulfil the pious and benevolent Intentions of the Royal Donor.

The unfeigned Attachment of the Right Honorable the Earl of Leven to your Majesty's sacred Person and Government; his approved Fidelity and Uprightness in the Execution of the important Trust with which he hath formerly been vested; that zealous and affectionate Regard to the Civil and Religious

gious Interests of his Country, by which he and his Ancestors have been distinguished; his amiable Character in private Life, and his good Offices to ourselves, render your Majesty's Re-Appointment of him to represent your Royal Person in this Assembly entirely acceptable to us; and, for this particular Testimony of your Royal Favour towards us, we feel, and desire to express, most cordial Gratitude.

Convinced that Unanimity, Charity, and Brotherly Love truly become our Assembly, and that, without them, no real Dignity or Utility can attend our Deliberations; we are solicitous to be possessed of those Qualities when we proceed in the Business more immediately before us; and we shall study so to comply with your Majesty's earnest and most wise Exhortations, as to bring our present Meeting to a happy Conclusion.

That the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ may establish your Throne in Righteousness, and in the Hearts of your People; that He may long preserve your Majesty the Guardian of Religion and Liberty; that He may enrich your Royal Consort, our most Gracious Queen, with all heavenly Blessings; that His Divine Favour may attend His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales and all your Royal Family; that your Descendants, to the latest Posterity, may sway the Sceptre over a free, a loyal, and a happy People; and that when He shall call you hence, full of Years and of Glory, He may give you a Kingdom which cannot be moved, are the Prayers of,

At the Lent Assizes, 1792, for the County of Cambridge, an Indictment was found by the Grand Jury against Spence Broughton and John Oxley for robbing the Cambridge Mail, near Bourn Bridge, on the 9th of June last; and at the same Assizes for the County of York an Indictment was likewise found against them for robbing the Mail between Sheffield and Rotherham on the 29th of January, 1791; on which last Indictment Broughton was tried and convicted.

Oxley escaped out of Clerkenwell Bridewell on the 31st of October last.

He is about Twenty-five Years of Age, Five Feet Ten Inches high, pale faced, rather pitted with the Small Pox, and his Nose turned a little to the Right.

Whoever shall secure the said John Oxley, and lodge him in any of the Goals of this Kingdom, within Three Months from the Date hereof, will be entitled to a Reward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be paid immediately on his Commitment.
