A PROCLAMATION.

WHEREAS Hostilities have broken out between the Most Christian King, and the King of Hungary; His Majesty, for the Preservation and Continuance of Friendship and Amity between Him and Their said Majesties, doth, by this His Royal Proclamation, (with the Advice of His Privy Council) strictly prohibit and forbid all His Subjects whatsoever, to take any Commission at Sea, from any Foreign Prince or State, against any other Foreign Prince or State now in Amity with His Majesty, or Their Subjects; or by Virtue or under Colour of any such Commission already taken, or hereafter to be taken, to set out or employ any Vessel or Ship of War, or to serve as Marines in any Ship or Vessel which shall be employed against any Prince or State now in Amity with His Majesty, or Their Subjects, during the present War. And all His Majesty's Subjects are required to take Notice of this His Royal Command, and to conform themselves to the same, upon Pain of incurring His Majesty's high Displeasure, and of being punished with the utmost Severity of Law and Justice. And whereas the Most Christian King hath caused Application to be made to His Majesty, that His Majesty would, conformably to the Third Article of the Treaty of Navigation and Commerce, concluded at Versailles the Twenty-sixth of September, One thousand seven hundred and eighty-six, renew and publish, in all His Dominions and

Countries, the strict and express Prohibitions contained in the said Article: His Majesty doth hereby strictly forbid all His Subjects to receive any Commission for arming and acting at Sea as Privateers, or Letters of Reprisals, from any Enemy of the Most Christian King, or by Virtue or under Colour of such Commissions or Reprisals, to disturb, infect, or any ways damage His Subjects; or to arm Ships as Privateers, or go out to Sea therewith, under the severest Punishments that can be inflicted on the Transgressors, besides being liable to make full Restitution and Satisfaction to those to whom they have done any Damage.

Given at Our Court at St. James's, the Twenty-fifth Day of May, One thousand seven hundred and ninety-two, in the Thirty-second Year of Our Reign.

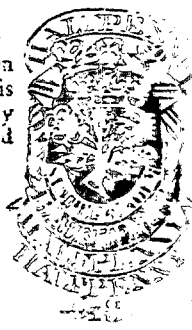

York House, May 29.

Her Royal Highness the Duchefs of York will have a Drawing-Room, in the Queen's Apartments at St. James's Palace, on Tuesday the 5th of June, at Two o'Clock.

Stockholm, April 27.

Mr. Ankarström, who discharged the Pistol at the late King of Sweden, has been sentenced, by the principal Tribunal of Stockholm, to have his Right Hand cut off; to be afterwards beheaded, and his Body to be divided into Four Parts and exposed upon the Wheel; and the Criminal was ordered to be publickly whipt in Three different Quarters of the Town, for Three successive Days previous to his Execution; which previous Punishment having been inflicted upon him, he was this Day beheaded accordingly.

Brussels, May 25.

This Government has received an Account, that General Sztaray, who had been quartered at Charle-roy, to watch the Movements of M. de la Fayette's Army, having understood that a large Detachment was posted at a Place called Florenne, at no great Distance from Philipville, he resolved to attack it, though his Force was much inferior; M. de Gou- vion's Numbers being estimated at Seven Thousand, and those of General Sztaray at but Three. The French, after an obstinate Resistance, in the End gave Way, leaving 150 dead, several wounded, Three Picces of Cannon, and all their Baggage and Am- munition; the Loss of the Auftrians was Four killed, and Twenty-two wounded. No more particular Circumstances of this Action are as yet received.

General Post Office, April 14, 1792.

AT the Lent Assizes, 1792, for the County of Cam- bridge, an Indictment was found by the Grand Jury against Spence Broughton and John Oxley for robbing the Cambridge Mail, near Bourn Bridge, on the 9th of June last; and at the same Assizes for the County of York an Indictment was likewise found against them for robbing the Mail between Sheffield and Rotheram on the 29th of January, 1791; on which last Indict- ment Broughton was tried and convicted.

Oxley escaped out of Clerkenwell Bridewell on the 31st of October last.

He is about Twenty-five Years of Age, Five Feet Ten Inches high, pale faced, rather pitted with the Small Pox, and his Nose turned a little to the Right.

Whoever shall secure the said John Oxley, and lodge him in any of the Goals of this Kingdom, within Three Months from the Date hereof, will be entitled to a Re- ward of ONE HUNDRED POUNDS, to be paid immediately on his Commitment.
