WHEREAS divers wicked and seditious Writings have been printed, published, and industriously dispersed, tending to excite Tumult and Disorder, by endeavouring to raise groundless Jealousies and Discontents in the Minds of Our faithful and loving Subjects, respecting the Laws and happy Constitution of Government, Civil and Religious, established in this Kingdom; and endeavouring to vilify and bring into Contempt the wise and wholesome Provisions made at the Time of the Glorious Revolution, and since strengthened and confirmed by subsequent Laws for the Preservation and Security of the Rights and Liberties of Our faithful and loving Subjects: And whereas divers Writings have also been printed, published and industriously dispersed, recommending the said wicked and seditious Publications to the Attention of all Our faithful and loving Subjects: And whereas we have also Reason to believe that Correspondencies have been entered into with sundry Persons in Foreign Parts, with a View to forward the criminal and wicked Purposes above mentioned. And whereas the Wealth, Happiness and Prosperity of this Kingdom do, under Divine Providence, chiefly depend upon a due Submission to the Laws, a just Confidence in the Integrity and Wisdom of Parliament, and a Continuance of that zealous Attachment to the Government and Constitution of the

Kingdom, which has ever prevailed in the Minds of the People thereof: And whereas there is nothing which We so earnestly desire as to secure the Publick Peace and Prosperity, and to preserve to all Our loving Subjects the full Enjoyment of their Rights and Liberties, both Religious and Civil: We, therefore, being resolved, as far as in Us lies, to repress the wicked and seditious Practices aforesaid, and to deter all Persons from following so pernicious an Example, have thought fit, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, solemnly warning all Our loving Subjects, as they tender their own Happiness, and that of their Posterity, to guard against all such Attempts, which aim at the Subversion of all regular Government within this Kingdom, and which are inconsistent with the Peace and Order of Society; and earnestly exhorting them at all Times, and to the utmost of their Power, to avoid and discourage all Proceedings, tending to produce Riots and Tumults; and We do strictly charge and command all Our Magistrates in and throughout Our Kingdom of Great Britain, that they do make diligent Enquiry, in order to discover the Authors and Printers of such wicked and seditious Writings as aforesaid, and all others who shall disperse the same: And We do further charge and command all Our Sheriffs, Justices of the Peace, chief Magistrates in Our Cities, Boroughs and Corporations, and all other Our Officers and Magistrates throughout Our Kingdom of Great Britain, that they do, in their several and respective Stations, take the most immediate and effectual Care to suppress

prets and prevent all Riots, Tumults and other Disorders, which may be attempted to be raised or made by any Person or Persons, which, on whatever Pretext they may be grounded, are not only contrary to Law, but dangerous to the most important Interests of this Kingdom: And We do further require and command all and every Our Magistrates aforesaid, that they do, from Time to Time, transmit to One of Our Principal Secretaries of State, due and full Information of such Persons as shall be found offending as aforesaid, or in any Degree aiding or abetting therein; it being Our Determination, for the Preservation of the Peace and Happiness of Our faithful and loving Subjects, to carry the Laws vigorously into Execution against such Offenders as aforesaid.

a Spirit of Sedition and Tumult, as tending to the Subversion of all Law and Government, and to involve all Orders of Men in Anarchy and Confusion:

Under these Impressions we desire to assure your Majesty, that it is our earnest Wish that your Majesty may long live to sway the British Sceptre, and reign the revered Sovereign of a loyal, a free, and a happy People.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Bailiffs and Commonalty of the City of Oxford in the County of Oxford, in Common Council assembled, beg Leave to express our unfeigned Gratitude for the fresh Mark of your Majesty's Watchfulness over the Safety of your Subjects, manifested in your late Royal Proclamation.

By this most seasonable Admonition your Majesty has performed the Part of the Father of your People; and we trust that the Promptitude of our Obedience will be some Proof of our unshaken Loyalty to your Majesty's Person, of our inviolable Attachment to our happy Constitution, and of our Confidence in the Integrity and Wisdom of Parliament.

Nor do we, your Majesty's faithful Subjects, conscious of the Possession of well-regulated Freedom, feel ourselves less insulted than we are injured by these Attempts to prove us to be the miserable Dupes of designing Tyranny.

We trust, that under the Pressure of real Grievances we never shall be wanting in Spirit and Perseverance to seek and to obtain Constitutional Redress; but, satisfied with the unexampled Blessings of our free Constitution, and rejoicing in the growing Prosperity of your Majesty's Dominions, we should fail in our Duty to your Majesty, to ourselves, and to our Posterity, if we did not exert our utmost Endeavours to detect, withstand, and discountenance all Attempts

to disturb the Public Tranquility; and every base and insidious Art to seduce and delude a happy People.

We should be unworthy of the Name of Englishmen, and the many Blessings and peculiar Advantages we enjoy, could we view with Indifference, or without the most profound Veneration, that excellent and invaluable Constitution, in Church and State, delivered down to us by our Ancestors, and which our Posterity have a Right to claim at our Hands; under which the People of this Nation have flourished, and become great and powerful; happy at Home, and respected Abroad; possessing in the utmost Extent their Civil and Religious Rights, and the full Enjoyment of true well-regulated Freedom. Few, we trust, will be found willing to adopt speculative Opinions, in Exchange for the happy Experience of Ages past; and we are well assured that the pernicious Doctrines, which have been promulgated, are in direct Opposition to the fixed Sentiments of the great Body of the People. The good Sense and Spirit of the People of England will be, as it hath been in former Times, a sufficient Safeguard and Protection to them; They will set a just Value on their present happy Condition, and will not be led away by the delusive Opinions of Men, who, under specious Appellations and the Shew of Patriotism, pursue a Conduct tend-

ing to subvert the Constitution and Government so happily established amongst them.

We beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that we shall hold it to be our indispensable Duty to pay the strictest Obedience to your Majesty's Royal Proclamation, which we cannot but consider as a fresh Instance of your Majesty's paternal Care and Anxiety for the Welfare of your People; and that we will cheerfully exert ourselves, to the utmost of our Power, as Magistrates and in our several Stations, to discourage and suppress every Attempt which may be made against the Public Peace and Order of Society. May the present Constitution of this Country, the Work of Ages, and the Admiration of Mankind, be perpetual. May Divine Providence support and protect it; and may your Majesty long continue to be, as you have been, it's faithful Guardian and Friend, and long enjoy the Affection and the Gratitude of a free and loyal People.
