as that, under which Nations, as well as Individuals, mistake Licentiousness for Liberty; and as we are convinced that regular Government, and a quiet Submission to these Laws, under which we and our Forefathers have flourished, are the only Security for our Rights, both as Men and as Subjects, lo we reprobate every Attempt to diffeminate fuch pernicious Principles as must, of Necessity, subvert them. Feeling that we have much Cause to bless God for having given us a Sovereign, who is the jealous Protector of our excillent Conflitution, we conceive it to be our indispensable Duty to second his gracious Intentions, and to obey his Commands. It shall be our Study, as far as the Influence of our Example and Authority can reach, to cherish those Sentiments of Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, for which the Inhabitants of this City have ever been distinguished, and to concur in those Mea-fures which your Royal Wisdom has suggested for handing down unimpaired to our Posterity the Bles-sings of that Constitution, under which we have the Happiness to live.

WE, your Majesty's most duriful and loyal Subyv jects, the Gentlemen, Clergy, Manufacturers, and other Inhabitants of the Town and Neighbourhood of Bolton-le-Moors, affembled at a Public Meeting on the 28th Day of May, 1792, for the Purpose of considering your Majesty's Proclamation, expressive of your Royal Pleasure to preserve the Peace and Order of these Kingdoms by an exemplary and feafonable Prevention of Practices tending
