To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, Burgesses and principal Inhabitants of the Town of Falmouth, in the County of Cornwall.

**WE**, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, Burgesses and principal Inhabitants of the Town of Falmouth in the County of Cornwall, most humbly beg Leave to express to your Majesty the great Pleasure and Satisfaction we feel on the Publication of your Majesty's Royal Proclamation for repressing the wicked and seditious Writings, which have of late been printed, published, and industriously dispersed, tending to excite Tumult and Disorder, and to raise groundless Jealousies and Discontents in the Minds of your Majesty's most faithful and loving Subjects; and to assure your Majesty of our zealous and warm Attachment to your Majesty's Person, and to the Government and Constitution of this Kingdom, as by Law established, which we will at all Times maintain and support at the Hazard of our Lives and Fortunes; taking every Method in our Power to give your Majesty's late Royal Proclamation it's full Force, by suppressing every wicked and seditious Attempt which may be made with a View to vilify and bring into Contempt the wise and wholesome Provisions made at the Time of the Glorious Revolution.

The King has also been pleased to grant to William Melville, of Thorpe Perrow, in the North Riding of the County of York, Esq; His Royal Licence and Authority to take and use the Surname of Milbanke, and bear the Arms of that Family, pursuant to the last Will and Testament of Jane Milbanke, of Thorpe Perrow aforesaid, Spinster, deceased; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms, and recorded in the Heralds Office: And also to order that this His Majesty's Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.
