Whitehall, June 23. HE following Address of the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Cambridge, has been prefented to the King by the Right Hon. William Pitt, Lord Eufton, and the Vice-Chancellor of the University : Which Addrefs His Majefly was pleafed to receive very gra-·ciouily.

To the KING's Moft Excellent Majefly,

The humble Address of the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Cambridge.

Moff Gracious Sovereign, WE, your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Chancellor, Matters, and Scholars of your Univerfity of Cambridge, in Senate affembled, humbly beg Leave to express our ex-treme Satisfaction at the falutary Measure now adopted by your Majesty, which we are perfuaded is wifely calculated to difcourage and difappoint the wicked Attempts of the Enemies of our happy Constitution. We havelong, with Grief, obferved the Promoters of Anarchy labouring with inceffant Industry to establish and spread Principles incom-patible with all Civil Government. But we trust that your Majesty's Exertions, feconded by your Two Houses of Parliament, whose Approbation of your Majesty's Proclamation breathes the true Spirit of Conflitutional Liberty, will give Confi-dence and Firmnefs to your faithful and loyal Subjects, and fecure the Obedience of those who might be in Danger of being missed by the fallacious Reasonings of designing Men, or tempted to risque new Revolutions, under the vain and delofive Hope of improving upon the most perfect of all known Political Conftitutions.

Senfible of the Happinels we derive from your Majefty's just and mild Government, and con-vinced that the Peace and Prosperity of these Kingdoms depend, under Divine Providence, upon

amongst the various Orders of the Community, we will not fail to instil into the Minds of those committed to our Care the true Principles of Religion and Loyalty, and to offer up to Almighty God our earnest Prayers that He will long continue your Majesty a Blessing to an united, loyar, and free People.
