The humble Address of the Gentlemen, Clergy, Freeholders and other Inhabitants of the County of Devon.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, humbly desire to express our most grateful Sense of that paternal Care and Solicitude for the Welfare of every Branch of the Community which has characterized the Whole of your Majesty's Reign. We are particularly sensible of the fresh Proof that your Majesty has given of these Dispositions in issuing your Royal Proclamation for the Prevention of those Evils, which, if suffered to gain Ground, might have endangered the Peace and Tranquillity of the Realm.
