We cheriſh no Sentiments with more genuine Warmth than thoſe of Love for our Sovereign, and of Reverence for the Conſtitution of Government ſo happily eſtabliſhed within this Realm; but we humbly beg Permiſſion to aſſure your Maſteſty, that Confidence in our own Strength ſhall not betray us into Neglect of the moſt active Efforts in our ſeveral Stations, by Example and Exhortation, and at every Hazard to co-operate with your Maſteſty and your Parliament in the Reſolutions adopted to diſcourage and reſeſs every Attempt to corrupt our Principles, or diſturb the Public Tranquillity.

Contemplating the Nature and Compoſition of our Legiſlature, in Compariſon with thoſe of other Countries, and the happy Order and Proportion of the ſeveral Parts of our preſent Form of Government, Civil and Religious, we readily diſcern in them the beſt and moſt certain Foundations of the National Welfare, and of the preſent fortunate Situation of this Realm; and we cannot but conceive and declare the moſt decided Averſion and Reſentment againſt thoſe who would injure your Maſteſty's People in their deareſt Concerns, by Endeavours to derange and confound a System and Circumſtances of unexampled Excellence and Proſperity. We are ſenſible that we cannot too ſtrongly inculcate in others the Conviction with which our own Minds are impreſſed, that on the Preſervation of the Peace and Order of Society, on the Efficacy of the Laws, and on the Permanency of the Conſtitution, eſſentially depend not only the juſt Authority and Dignity of the Crown, but the real Welfare and Happineſs of all and each individual Citizen of your Maſteſty's Kingdom; the full Enjoyment of the Fruits of their Industry, and the invariable Security of their Privileges and Liberties.

The good Senſe, as well as the Attachment of the People, will always make them ſee and be anxious to maintain the neceſſary and harmonious Connection between all Orders of the Community, between their Interests and thoſe of the Crown; and may the Bleſſing of God upon our Duties, our Affections and our Prayers, keep it long in full Luſtre upon the ſacred Head which has hitherto ſo exemplarily worn it.
