THE following Addresses have been presented to His Majesty: Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's loyal Subjects, the Archbishop, the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral and Metropolitan Church, and the Archdeacon and Clergy of the Diocese of Canterbury, humbly beg Leave to approach your Throne with the most unfeigned Duty, and desirous to express the most thankful Sense of your Majesty's constant Solitude for the Welfare of all those who are placed by Providence under your Government.

In the Proclamation lately issued by your Royal Authority we have to acknowledge also, with especial Gratitude, that a new and distinguished Testimony has been given to us of that paternal Care, under which your Majesty is at all Times zealous to preserve inviolate the Ecclesiastical and Civil Constitution of these Realms.

We have seen, with the most heartfelt Satisfaction, the general Anxiety of all Ranks of your Majesty's Subjects to applaud a Measure, so well directed to the Security of those Interests which are most dear to them; and we are earnest to make it known to your Majesty, that whilst we venerate the happy Constitution under which we live, we yield to none in the Sense we entertain of the Benefit of those Exertions, which it hath seemed good to your Majesty's Wisdom to use in Support of it.

We further assure your Majesty, that under the Sense of Duty which belongs to us, in common with our Fellow Subjects, and as acting likewise under the more immediate Obligations of our holy Profession, we shall, with one Mind, labour to co-operate with the gracious Intentions which your Majesty has manifested.

As Ministers of the Gospel, we know ourselves especially called upon to promote Peace, the Habits

of good Order, and the Well-being of Society, the very Foundation of which can be laid only in a true Sense of Religion and a pure Obedience to it's Laws: And as Citizens of a Country distinguished amongst the Nations of the Earth for it's Happiness and Liberty, we feel ourselves in the Possession of that, which it must be our best Wisdom to maintain with Steadfastness, both against the bold Violence of open Sedition, and that Danger with which the loose and intemperate Spirit of Innovation may threaten it.

We pray fervently that your Majesty may long reign in the Hearts of a faithful and free People, and that the Almighty may at all Times aid your Councils with his holy Wisdom and Guidance.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Archbishop, and Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of St. Peter, in York.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and affectionate Subjects, the Archbishop, and Dean and Chapter of your Cathedral and Metropolitan Church of St. Peter in York, beg Leave to express our Concurrency in the general Approbation which your Majesty's Proclamation has received; from the reasonable issuing of which we have all derived a Comfort, considering it as wisely calculated to repress the insatuated Project of creating a Bond of Union among the Vicious and Profligate, against the honest and respectable Part of your Majesty's Subjects, and of overturning those venerable Instruments of Order, by which alone are upheld all the Interests of Civil Society.

We are duly sensible that our Function requires from us a strict Attention to the Principles of the People committed to our Charge, both as Fellow Citizens and Fellow Christians; and your Majesty may be assured, that we shall continue to make it our anxious and constant Care to instruct and confirm them in just Sentiments of Duty and Loyalty, and to impress upon their Minds the golden Rule of the Wise Man, which contains in it the Essence both of practical Religion and sound Policy: "To fear God, to honour the King, and not to meddle with them that are given to Change."

OF your Majesty's watchful Care over the Rights and Interests of your People a stronger or more seasonable Proof could not have been given than that which your late Royal Proclamation affords.

The wicked Attempts of a few restless Spirits to disturb the Minds of the happiest Nation upon Earth, and alienate their Affections from that envied Constitution, which is the Source and Security of their Liberty and Happiness, call upon the Virtuous of all Orders to express their Abhorrence of such Proceedings, and check the Progress of them by every Means in their Power.

It surely becomes the Ministers of the established Religion of the Country, above all others, to stand forward on such an Occasion. The Principles they profess and teach, and that intimate Relation which they hold with the State, require it of them.
