THE following Addresses having been delivered or transmitted to the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, have been by him presented to the King: Which Addresses His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Bishop, Dean and Chapter, Archdeacons and Clergy of the Diocese of Lincoln, humbly approach your Majesty with Sentiments of the warmest Affection to your Royal Person, and of invariable Attachment to our Constitution in Church and State. We beg Leave to express to your Majesty our most grateful Acknowledgements for the recent and seasonable Instance of your vigilant Attention to the Welfare of your People, in issuing your Royal Proclamation for the Suppression of seditious Publications, and for the Maintenance of Public Tranquillity. Convinced that we now enjoy the Blessings of Civil and Religious Liberty to an Extent unknown in the History of Mankind; and that these Kingdoms have arrived at an unexampled Height of Power and Prosperity, we have observed with equal Astonishment and Concern, the daring Attempts which have been lately made to excite Discontent and Confusion in this free and flourishing Country. The Opinions which weak or designing Men are endeavouring to disseminate are not only subversive of our happy Constitution, but are also repugnant to the fundamental Principles of political Government, and incompatible with that Subordination which is essential to the very Existence of Civil Society. It is the Duty and Interest of all Orders of Men to unite their zealous Exertions for the Purpose of checking these mischievous and groundless Theories; but we feel ourselves, as Ministers of the Gospel of Peace, peculiarly called upon, in this Hour of Alarm and Danger, to inculcate the Christian Precepts of Obedience to Magistrates, and of quiet and peaceable Conduct. Our Prayers will never be wanting, that your Majesty may long continue to reign in the

Hearts of a free and loyal People, and that the Crown of these Kingdoms may descend, in unimpaired Splendour, to your latest Posterity.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

THE Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, Freeholders, and other Inhabitants of the County of Dorset, assembled by publick Advertisement, beg Leave to approach your Throne, to testify their grateful and unanimous Acknowledgements of the unremitting Care and Attention you have invariably bestowed to preserve to them, unimpaired, a Constitution, which, whilst it possesses the Admiration, excites the Envy of surrounding Nations. Impressed, Sire, with these Sentiments, they cannot see but with the deepest Regret any Attempt made to shake the publick Confidence in that glorious Fabrick, which the Wisdom and Virtue of their Ancestors have transmitted to them.

The Advantages which, under the Government of your Majesty and your illustrious Ancestors, have been derived from legal and well-regulated Freedom, and the unexampled Blessings which we actually enjoy, afford to your Majesty's Subjects peculiar Motives to reflect with Gratitude on their present Situation, and to beware of those delusive Theories, which are inconsistent with the Relations and Duties of all Civil Society; and we deem it, under the present Circumstances, the peculiar Duty of every good Citizen to discourage and counteract every Attempt, direct or indirect, against Public Order and Tranquillity.

Impressed with these Opinions, we think it our Duty to assure your Majesty of our firm Determination to support you in the Resolution which your Majesty has adopted: And we are fully persuaded that every Exertion which may be necessary will be seconded by the Zeal and Gratitude of a loyal People.
