

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Inhabitants of the City
and Neighbourhood of Carlisle.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the Inhabitants of the City and Neighbourhood of Carlisle, beg Leave to approach the Throne with the most cordial Assurances of Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government, and at the same Time to express the strong Sense we entertain of the Blessings derived to us from our happy Constitution in Church and State.

It is not without much Regret that we have seen the misguided Efforts which have been made to weaken, in the Minds of your Majesty's Subjects, the Sentiments of Submission to the Laws, and of Confidence in Parliament, upon which (under Divine Providence) chiefly depends the Continuance of those distinguished Advantages which we now actually enjoy.

Satisfied that real Liberty can exist only under the Protection of Law and the Authority of efficient Government, and that the mixed Form of our Legislature comprehends and provides for the Interest of all the various Descriptions of the Community, we wish to offer to your Majesty our most grateful Acknowledgements for your late Royal Proclamation.

We think it a Measure wisely calculated to repress seditious Practices, and guard the unwary against the dangerous Effects of those delusive Theories of Government, which have been industriously circulated in every Part of the Kingdom: We trust that the groundless Jealousies and Discontents which are endeavoured to be raised in the Minds of your Majesty's faithful Subjects will soon subside, that they will be thankful for this fresh Instance of your Majesty's earnest Solicitude for their Welfare, and that your Majesty's wise Precautions for the Peace and Happiness of the People will be supported and seconded by the vigorous Exertions of every free and loyal Subject.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and affectionate Subjects, the Residentiary and Prebendaries of your Collegiate Church of St. Mary in Southwell, together with the Clergy of the Jurisdiction of the Chapter of Southwell, feeling ourselves relieved from many uneasy Apprehensions by the issuing of your Royal Proclamation, beg Leave to approach your Throne with those Expressions of Gratitude which the Occasion demands, and which neither our Reason nor our Duty will allow us to withhold.
