Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Bishop, Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church, and Clergy of the Diocese of Ely, sensible of the Happiness we enjoy under our free and well-regulated Constitution in Church and State, approach your Majesty's Throne to express our grateful Satisfaction in your Majesty's wise and reasonable Proclamation against those mischievous and evil-minded Persons who seek to overthrow it. Such a Proof of your paternal Concern for the inalienable Privileges of your People, and for the Support of all just and lawful Authority, is a fresh Incitement to that Affection and Veneration for your Person and Government, which will ever secure our firm Attachment to the one, and our steady and vigorous Support of the other.

to the Repose but the very Existence of any regular Community.

On these Persuasions, and under the deepest Impressions of Gratitude to Almighty God our gracious Protector, and sincerest Affection to your Majesty's Royal Person and Family, and influenced as we are with the highest Regard for that Political System which so temperately unites and regulates all our Civil and Ecclesiastical Duties, we will carefully and thankfully comply with the Admonitions of your Majesty's Authority and Will. We profess ourselves zealously disposed to detect and obviate every Sophistry and Error so perniciously calculated to mislead the Unwary. To inculcate Peace and good Order, as far as our Influence extends, to promote an Intercourse of Christian Love and Charity amongst all Denominations of our Fellow Subjects, and on every Occasion to inculcate the Cause of Gospel Truth and legal Freedom, the Basis of our National Establishment, against those who insidiously endeavour to subvert them by their present dangerous and ill-timed Innovations.
