To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

The Bishop, Dean and Chapter, Archdeacons, and Clergy of the Diocese of Norwich, beg Leave to approach your Majesty's Throne with Assurances of sincere Attachment to your Person, and of Zeal for the Laws and Constitution of the Land. In the one we contemplate, with unaffected Veneration, those Virtues which adorn private Life, and add Lustre to the Crown; in the other we experience all the Advantages of which Society is capable, Freedom, Order, Security.

Under these Impressions, it is impossible that we should not have observed, with equal Regret and Abhorrence, the Industry with which seditious Writings have been circulated, for the Purposes of poisoning the Minds of the ignorant, and alienating the Affections of the many, from that Form of Government which has hitherto been the Pritain, and the Envy of

Europe.

As the Ministers of the Gospel, and therefore the Ministers of Peace, it is our Duty, and shall always be our earnest Care, as well by Example as by Precept, to discourage and prevent, as far as we are able, every Tendency to Disaffection, Disturbance, or Sedition. Sensible of the Blessings we enjoy under a free Government and a virtuous King, our Prayers are anxiously directed to Heaven for a long Continuance of them; for the Continuance of Health to your Majesty; and of Freedom, Order and Loyalty to your People.

Firmly attached to those rational Principles of Liberty, which are equally essential to the true Dignity of the Sovereign and the Happiness of the People, and which can subsist only by Means of regular Government and a due Subordination of the various Ranks of Society, we shall make it our earnest Endeavour to co-operate, in our Stations, with the Intentions signified in your Majesty's gracious Proclamation, and to discourage every Measure which, under the Pretext of holding forth visionary Schemes of Liberty, tends to subvert that Regard which we owe to our happy Constitution, and pave the Way to public Anarchy and Confusion; and we shall be careful to inculeate into the Youth under our Charge those Principles of Submission to legal Government, without which no Nation can prosper, nor true Liberty subsist.

That it may please Almighty God to preserve long

your valuable Life; that you may be happy in your Family, and enjoy the greatest Blessing a virtuous Sovereign can feel, that of reigning in the Hearts of a tree and orderly, an affectionate and prosperous People, shall ever be our earnest Wish and servent Prayer.
