To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor and Alderman of the Borough of Stockton upon Teese, in the County of Durham.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor and Aldermen of the Borough of Stockton upon Teese, in the County of Durham, humbly beg Leave to express to your Majesty our grateful Acknowledgements for the paternal Care and Attention to the Interests and Happiness of your People, manifested by your late Royal Proclamation.

And as we are fully sensible of the Blessings resulting from the present Establishments, both in Church and State, and of the Happiness we derive from your Majesty's just and mild Government, we will, to the utmost of our Power, discourage and repress every Attempt that shall be made to alienate the Affections of your Subjects, or which, by professing to reform, shall have a Tendency to subvert our happy Constitution.
