HE following Address having been transmitted to the Right Honorable Henry Dundas, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been by him prefented to the King: Which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously.

Unto the KING.

WE, your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Miniflers and Elders of the Prefbytery of Dingwall, beg Leave to approach the Throne, and to exprefs our fincere Gratitude for every new and to express our incere Gratitude for every new Inftance of your Majefty's Exertions towards the Maintenance of our happy Conflitution, the Prefer-vation of the Peace, and the promoting of the Prof-perity of thefe Kingdoms. Senfible of the invaluable Bleffings which we enjoy, as Citizens of a free Coun-try, we thould behold with Abhorrence every Attempt to unbings the Suffer of our Courses and the suffer to unhinge the Syftem of our Government, as planned at the ever-memorable Revolution, and we should confider with Indignation any Writings which could poffibly have this baneful Tendency. Feeling thefe Sentiments, it is with the utmost Pleasure we affure your Majefty that we and our People are entire Strangers to all fuch Views or Publications; and that, however ardently we do wish for the Correc-tion of those Abuses which, in the general Imperfection of human Affairs, may have crept into our Con-Attution, and for the full Invigoration of every Principle of Liberty which is confittent with regular Government, we thall, by our publick Infructions and by our private Example, difcourage any Ap-proach towards Sedicion; we thall earneftly inculcate every Degree of respectful Subordination to the Laws of the Land; and we shall fedulously cherish among our People habitual Veneration for the Principles of our Conftitution, as established at the Glo-.rious Revolution.

That your Majefty may long reign over a free and a happy People; that you may lay down your Earthly Crown only to be exchanged for a Heavenly one; and that Almighty God may confer his Bleffing on every Branch of your Family, are the vearneftPrayer of your Majefty's affectionate Sub-

IN Pursuance of the Directions of an Act passed in the Twenty-fourth Year of the Reign of His prefent Majesty King George the Third, initialed, "An Act to repeal fo much of Two Acts, made in "the Tenth and Fifteenth Years of the Reign of " His prefent Majefty, as authorizes the Speaker of " the Houle of Commons to isfue his Warrant to " the Clerk of the Crown for making out Writs for " the Election of Members to ferve in Parliament, " in the Manner therein mentioned; and for fubfti-tuting other Provisions for the like Purpoles;" I do hereby give Notice, that it hath been certified to me in Writing, under the Hands of Two Mem-bers of Parliament, that the Honorable George Augustus North, commonly called Lord North, late Member of Parliament for the Borough of Ban-bury, in the County of Oxford, is become a Peer of Great Britain, and fummoned to Parliament ; and that I shall issue my Warrant to the Clerk of the Crown to make out a new Writ for the electing of a Burgefs to ferve in this prefent Parliament for the faid Borough of Banbury, in the Room of the faid George Augustus North, commonly called Lord North, now a Peer of Great Britain, and furmoned to Parliament as aforefaid, at the End of Fourteen Days after the Infertion of this Notice in the Dated the Thirty-first Day of August, One Gazette.
