To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty:

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majefty's ever dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Nobility, Gentry, Clergy, Freeholders and other Inhabitants of the County of Lincoln, humbly beg Leave to offer our most unfeigned Thanks for that Love and Affection your Majefty has ever shewn towards your People, which is fufficiently manifest from that constant paternal Care and Attention that your Majefty has at all Times paid, in pursuing every Meastre that could possibly promote the true Interest and Happiness of all your Subjects : And more efpecially we defire to express our Gratitude for your Majefty's late most gracious Proclamation, iffued fo feasonably, at a Time when many Publications, pregnant with feditious Principles, to our utter Detestation, were distributed in many Parts of the Kingdom, tending to create Distaffection in the Minds of your Majefty's faithful Subjects, and feemingly with a View to fubvert that glorious Constitution, which has fo long and fo justly been the Admiration, and even the Envy of furrounding Nations.

This, our happy Conflictution, we fhall always exert our utmost Power to maintain and support both in Church and State: In the Execution thereof we may ever hope for Success, so long as we shall be bleft in having at our Head so good, so patriotic a King.

That your Majefty may for many Years continue, in perfect Health, to reign over these Realms; and that the fame Liberty and Bleffings, rendered to us under your Majefty's mild and auspicious Reign, may be handed down to after Ages, under the Protection and Government of your Majefty's Reyal
