-totally destroy that Country. Our Letters from renna tell his of the alarm people there were in, upon the news they had that the Rebels, being about scoop strong, taking the advantage of Count Lefly's havn g passed the River Tais, were come down into the lower Hungary, to a place called Trenezin, about 16 Leagues from Vienna, from whence it was believed they would fall into Moravia. From the Hague we have advice, that her Royal Highness and the Lady Ann, fafely arrived there on Wednesday last, at ten a

clock at night.

Paris, Office. 15. The 10th instant their Majesties came to Sr. Cloud, and will part thence again to morrow for Vérlailles, where the Court will pass greatest part of the Winter. From Alface we have an account, that the Marcichal de Crequi belieges the Calile of Lichtentourg the Town having furrendred upon the , first approach of his Troops; that the Besieged made a good defence, and that the Count de Montpeiroux. and two or three other Officers, had been wounded · near the Mareichal de Crequi, from whom they were -receiving orders; and from Flanders they write, that the Duke of Laxemburg was marching with the Army under his command towards Aix la Chapelle and *fuliers*, and that it was believed he would go -firther, to pass the Rhine, and fall into the Countries of the Elector of Brandenburg, if the Cessation of Arms, which is treating at Nimeguen, be not concluded before. We are told that eight Men of War Lare fitting out, which are defig ed for the Balticke, to allist the bucdes.

Ditto, Oltob, 19. We are now expecting every day to hear of the arrival of the Ratifications of the Peace from Spain; from Mlface our Letters tells us, that our Troops find much more work in the Siege of the Castle of Lichtemburg than they had expected, and that above 100 Men, and several Officers were killed and wounded in it. We hear nothing farther from the Duke of Luxemburg's Army, which we told you in our last was marched towards Aix and Juiers. We have here the following Account of the Descent made by the Danes and Brandenburgs upon the Isle of Rugen; That on the 24 of September, Admiral Fuels having been to confer with the Elector of Brandenburg, concerning the intended descent, and resolved with him that it should be made the next day, returned to his Fleet; accordingly on the 22, 2000 Danes landed at wittow, after having been twice repulsed by 300 Finlanders, under the command of Colonel de Liefde, - who upon the third charge were obliged, to netire to *Halmunt*, with the loss of half their number. The same day the Brandenburgs attempted to land at fasmund, at Prork, and at Grabus, but were repulsed in all three places; the next day,being the 23, they got ashore at the Clevitzer-schans, but the Sucdes received them so well, that they overthrew 300 of them into the Sea, and took 120 prifoners; but while they thus repulled the Enemy on this fide, the Elector of Brandenburg landed in perfon at Wick, near Putbus, and before the Suedes could be in a posture to oppose him, had got 3000 mien alhore, commanded by the Velt-Mareschal Darfling. Count Conigfmarke, accompanied with the Count de Rebenae the French Envoy, marched im-mediately thither with 1500 men, but found the Brandenburgs very well retrenched, and that they

tire, as he did, towards the cld Veer-schans, the Velt-Mareschal Dorsting following him at the head of 4000 men. As foon as Count Coning fmarke was come to the Veer schans, he sent orders to the Troops that were policid at Jasmund, and at Monkekut, to repair thither, and employed the rest of the day in transporting his Artillery, and most of his Troops over to Straelfond. The 24th he followed himself, leaving only some Troops in the old and new Veerfebans, which were that day and the following ta-ken by the Brandenburgs. All the Germans that were in the service of Sueden, abandoned Count Coning marke to foon as they understood the Enemy was landed, and returned to the service of the Danes and Brandenburgs, in which they were, when Count Coning marke retook the life of Rugen from them; and to the Suedes, the Enemy gave no quarter; and from Wismar we have Letters of the 28 past, which say, that Count Coning marke being received with his Troops into Straelford, had made a Sally upon the Luneaburgs, who were posted at Bransbagen, and had beaten them from that
