To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Magistrates and Town Council of the Royal Burgh of Wick, in Common Council affembled.

Mast Gracious Sovereign,

E, your Majesty's dutiful and loyal Subjects,
the Magistrates and Town Council of the Borough of Wick, beg Leave to approach the Throne with Sentiments of the highest Veneration and Respect for your Majesty's facred Person and Government, and of the most inviolable Attachment to our happy Constitution, and with Hearts overslowing with Gratitude and Thankfulness for the late Instance of your Majesty's fatherly Regard and unremitted Attention for the Safety and Welfare of your People, manifested in the late Proclamation against seditious Writings and Publications.

Sensible as we are of the inestimable Blessings and Privileges we enjoy under a Government, the best that Human Wisdom ever devised, we cannot but lament that there should be Individuals in the Kingdom, who, under the specious, though false Appearance of Patriotism, endeavour, by their Writings, to disseminate Doctrines of the most dangerous Tendency, subversive of the fundamental Principles of the Constitution, and calculated to excite a Spirit of Sedition and Revolt throughout the Nation, and that too at a Time when, perhaps, there never was less Cause for those Fears and Jealousies which seem to actuate the Authors of these scandalous and se-ditious Publications; and we beg Leave to assure your Majesty, not only of our utter Abhorrence and Detestation of all such Writings, but also of our hearty Concurrence in every constitutional Massage

for the Suppression thereof, and bringing the deluded Authors thereof to a due Sense of their Errors.

We earneftly pray that your Majesty may long wield the Sceptre of the British Empire in Peace and Tranquility, and that the same may be handed down to your Royal Descendants to the latest Posterity.
