

GENERAL POST-OFFICE, September 22, 1792.

**T**O prevent the Loss of entire Notes or Drafts, payable to Bearer, in Letters put into any Post-Office or Receiving-House, the Postmaster-General repeat the Recommendation, so often inserted in the London Gazettes, and circulated by Hand-Bills throughout the Kingdom; namely, to cut all such Notes or Drafts in half in the following Form, to send them at Two different Times, and to wait for the Return of the Post till the Receipt of One Half is acknowledged before the other is sent.

And, when any Cash, in Gold or Silver, or when any Rings or Locketts, &c. are sent per Post from London, particular Care should be taken to deliver the same to the Clerk at the Window, or to the Clerk of the Money-Book, at the General-Post-Office; and, when any such Letter is to be sent from a Country Post-Office, it should be delivered into the Hands of the Postmaster.
