Camp in Myfore, April 5, 1792.

5 I R, Have the Honor to encicle a Copy of the Defi-nitive Treaty* which has then concluded between the Three Confederate Powers and Tippoo Sultaun, accompanied with a Schedule* of the Names of the Difirities that have been ceded by that Prince to the Allies reiprétively, to be laid before His Majefty.

I think it unneceffary to trouble you with a Repe-tition of the Contents of my Dispatch of this Date to the Court of Directors, which will come officially into your Hands : But I request that you will be pleased to communicate to His Majesty the Account contained in that Difpatch, of the Circumftances that occurred between the Signature of the Preliminary Articles and the Conclusion of the Definitive Treaty, and the Defcription that I have given of the Countries that have been ceded to the Company,

The Troops of the Allies will separate from us in a few Days, to retarn to their respective Countries; and I shall use my utmost Exercions to fend all the Regiments of this Army to their Stations in the Company's Territories, and to reduce both the Native Troops and the different Public Departments to the Perce Effablishment with as little Lofs of Time as may be possible.

To the Honorable Court of Directors for Affairs of the Honorable the United Company of Merchants of England trading to the East Indies.

HONOPABLE SIRS,

Have the Honor to enclose a Copy of the Definitive Treaty which has been concluded with Tippoo Sultaun, conformably to the Tenor and Spirit of the Preliminary Articles which I transmitted to you by the last Dispatch, with a Copy of the Schedule, which was an exed to the Treaty, containing the Names of the Diffricts that have been ceded by

Tippoo to the Allies. You were informed by my Letter, dated the 4th Ultimo, that being aware that Tippoo would practile every possible Art to evade a strict Execution of his Engagements, I had determined to maintain the Pofts that we occupied before Seringapatam until every Arrangement for carrying the Preliminary Articles of Peace into full Effect could be completed; and I had foon Reafon to believe that none of my Precautions were fuperfluous.

After fending out, by his Revenue Officers, fome Statements of his Revenues, that were evidently fabricated and incorrect, and which confecuently were rejected, he at last declared, that, owing to his having lost a great Number of his Papers in Places that had been taken by the Allies, or in his Camp on the Night of the Aftion, it was not in his Power to give a regular arthenticated Account of the Re-venues of different Diffricts of his Country, though he perfevered in afferting that, after deducting the Expenses of Collection, they did not much exceed Two Crore.

A Statement, therefore, was formed from the beft Materials in the Possession of the Allies, which rated his Dominions at Two Crore and Sixry Lacs of net Revenue ; and upon which it was proposed, that the Division



Division of his Country should be made according to the Terms of the Preliminary Articles; but, upon it's being produced, he positively objected to it's Correctness, othering, however, after some Discuffio is, to allow the Division to take Place upon the Ground that his net Revenue amounted to something above Two Crore and Thirty-feven Lacs; to which, with the entire Concurrence of Hurry Punt and Azeem ul Omrah, 1 judged it adviseable to give my Assent.

Upon the Adjuftment of this indifpenfable Préliminary Point, further Difficulties were flarted, by his objecting, with great Warmth, to cede fome of the Districts which had been included by the Allies in the Selection of their refpective Portions, and, above all others, his Repugnance to relinquift the Coorja Country, which I was determined to obtain for the Company, as being neceffary to form a fecure Barrier for our new Poffellions on the Coatl of Malabar against every Power above the Ghauts, appeared at one Time to be almost infurmountable.

At this Stage of the Negociation the Allies were not only in Possession of his Two Sons as Hottages, but also of above Eleven Hundred Thousand Pounds of the Sum that he had agreed to pay, in ready Money, which I should have confidered as fufficient Pledges from any other Man for the Performance of the Whole of the Preliminary Articles ; but, faithlefs and violent as Tippoo's Character was known to be, I judged it incumbent upon me to be prepared to support by Force, if it should prove necessary, the Rights that we had acquired by the Preliminaries, and, with that View, I requested, in Addition to feveral other Measures, that Perferam Bhow would crofs the Caveri and join General Abercromby, in order that we might be ready to act with Efficacy, and without Lofs of Time, against Seringapatam, if a Renewal of Hossilities should become unavoidable; refolving, at the fame Time, that the Armies should not quit the Positions that they occupied until the Articles of the Definitive Treaty should be arranged , and actually figned.

As any material Interruption, and fill more a total Breach in the Negociation, would have been attended with 'great Inconvenience to our Affairs; I was relieved from much Anxiety when Tippoo, upon further Reflection, withdrew all his Objections, and confented, on the 16th Ultimo, to fign the Definitive Treaty; and the firft Payment of One Crore and Sixty-five Lacs of Rupees being alfo completed in a few Days, Perferam Bhow repaffed the River, and, after evacuating the Trenches and our Pofts upon the Ifland, all the Confederate Forces began to move from Seringapatam on the 26th Ultimo. The Orders for the mutual Ceffion of Forts and Diftricts, conformable to the Treaty, having alfo been previoufly interchanged, I truft that in the Courfe of a few Weeks Tippoo will be in Poffeifion of the Dominions that are left to him, and that the Armies of the Allies will have returned within the new Boundaries of their refpective Countrics.

It muß, no doubt, be highly gratifying to you, that a War, into which we were forced by every Confideration of good Faith and found Policy, has not only terminated in the Reduction of the Strength of a Neighbour of great Power, and of the moff inordinate Ambition, but alfo in fecuring Acquifitions to ourfelves, which, exclusive of their inefimable Value in Point of Situation, add confiderably to your Revenues, and promife to open Sources of Commerce in Pepper, Cardamums, Teak, Sandal

Wood, &c. that may be looked upon as of great Importance both to the Company and to the Nation. By the Statement of Tippoo's Revenues, upon

By the Statement of Tippoo's Revenues, upon which it was finally agreed by all Parties that his Country fhould be divided according to the Terms of the Preliminary Articles, the Company's Portion amounted to fomething above Thirty-nine Lacs and a Half of Rupees or net Revenue; and by an Infpection of the General Map you will readily perceive, that although, in order to reduce the Company's Share to that Sum, I was obliged to relinquish a few finall Diffricts on the Top of the Ghauts, that properly belong to the Baramaul, but which are not neceffary for the Security of our Frontier, I have availed myfelf of our Right of Selection by demanding and obtaining for the Company's Portion, Countries, that are both firong in themfelves, and peculiarly well calculated to form a Barrier to your antient Poffeffions.

The Diffricts ceded to us on the Coaft of Malabar confift of the Whole of the Tract of Country below the Ghauts, laying between Travencore and the Kaway River, which is our Northern Boundary; and they are fo fortunately fituated, that it will be difficult, if not impofible, for Tippoo, or any future Sovereign of Myfore, to diffurb them.

Palicautcherry commands the only Road by which an Army can approach them from the Carnatic Side; the only Paffes that lead into them from the Myfore Country, viz. the Tambercherry and Pondicherrum Paffes, are, from their belonging to our Tributaries, in Reality, in our own Poffefion; and the Northern Frontier is, from the Ruggedness of the Country, and from it's being interfected with a Number of deep Ravines and feveral confiderable Rivers, exceedingly inacceffible.

Diadigul conflitutes a fubftantial Protection to the Southern Provinces; and by the Acquisition of the Baramaul, and of the Country, which, though composed of feveral different Districts, is commonly called the Salem Country, which gives us the Command of all the Passes of the Ghauts to the Northward of the Caveri, we have obtained an effectual Barrier to the Carnatic against all future Invasions from the Westward; and, exclusive of the principal Forts of Sankerydroog, Namcool, Attoor, Kiftnagherry, and Ryacotta, which no Power in India could take from us, and which an invading Army could not pass without hazarding the Loss of it's Supplies, there are a Number of fmaller Forts in those Districts that, in case of a temporary Irruption of a Corps of Cavalry, would be capable of affording great Protection to the Perfons and Property of the Inhabitants.

Had the Extent of our Share of the Ceffions made by Tippoo admitted of it, I fhould have had great Satistaction in adding the Country of Coimbateor to to the Company's other Poffeffions, principally for the Purpole of depriving the Mylore Power of all Footing below the Gliauts, on the Carnatic Side: But the Difappointment is of the lefs Confequence as it is a defencelefs open Country, which, in cafe of a future Rupture, nothing lefs than Tippoo's whole Force could attempt to defend againft us, and from which he could not, without the greateft Difficulty and Danger, venture to invade the Carnatic.

inordinate Ambition, but alfo in fecuring Acqui fittions to ourfelves, which, exclusive of their ineftimable Value in Point of Situation, add confiderably to your Revenues, and promife to open Sources of Commerce in Pepper, Cardamums, Teak, Sandal could eafily be made practicable for an Army; and having lately had Occafion to order a Detachment to afcend the Guzzlehatty Pafs, we have had an Opportunity to afcertain that it is, of all the Pafies leading into the Carnatic, by much the most fleep and difficult.

The Nature, therefore, of the País by which his Artillery and Stores must come from Myfore, would prove no inconfiderable Obstacle to Tippoo in forming a Defign against the Carnatic from that Quarter; and, as I trust that he could neither take Dindigul, Trichinopoly, Tanjore, Sankerydroog, or Namcul, which are our Frontier Forts on that Side, I look upon it to be almost impossible that he, or any of his Succeflors, will venture to pass the Coleroon with an Army into the Center of the Carnatic, leaving their Supplies and Communications of all Kinds exposed to be attacked and interrupted by the Garririsons of the Places that I have mentioned, supported by Bodies of Troops that might be stationed for the Purpose under their Cover and Protection.

I am convinced that Sir Charles Oakley and General Abercromby will felect the most capable and truft-worthy of your Servants to manage the newly acquired Territories; and General Abercromby agreed fo perfectly with me that it was of the utmost Importance for the National Character, and for the Interest of the Company, that we should commence our Government of the Countries on the Coast of Malabar upon a good Plan, that it was concerted between us, that it would be most prudent, before we divided them finally into Diffricts, to appoint Commislioners to make a temporary Settlement with all the Chiefs for this Seafon, and then to proceed upon an active and earnest Investigation of the Amount of Revenue that those Acquisitions are capable of paying, the Extent of the different Articles of Commerce, the Nature of the Tenures of the Rajahs or other Chiefs, and the Claffes and Numbers of the Inhabitants, in order that the Supreme Government may be enabled from their Reports, and the Observations and Suggestions of the Government of Bombay, to propole a System for the future Management of that Country, which may include Rules for the Conduct of the Revenue and Commercial Departments, and, above all, for a strict and impartial Administration of Justice: And, as many of the Ben-gal Servants have had great Experience in conducting the internal Bufiness of extensive Indian Provinces, it is my Intention to depute Two of those in whom I can place particular Confidence, as foon as the Change of the Monfoon will render it practicable, to join Two Commissioners that General Abercromby will, at my Recommendation, appoint, immediately to commence upon the Undertaking that I have defcribed, and to affift in collecting the neceffary Materials, and in framing the Report that will be expected from them.

That Coast has been in a State of great Distraction and Confusion fince the Time that Tippoo's Troops, and the Officers of his Government, were driven out of it; the Two great and inimical Classes of the People, the Nairs and Moplas; being almost at open War with each other, and great Disfensions about Boundaries, and revived old Claims prevailing amongft the Nair Rajahs themfelves; but as General Abercromby will immediately, upon descending the Ghauts, detach Troops into the different Districts, I hope that I shall foon hear that Tranquillity has been restored, and the Company's Authority completely established throughout all these Countries.

I shall defer giving a final Opinion refjecting the Military Establishment that will be necessary in future, until L can be more minutely informed than I am at prefent of the Condition of the Forts, and the internal State of the Countries that we have acquired; but I am much inclined to believe that the whole of the Augmentation in the Native Troops, that was made at the Commencement of the War, may be reduced with the utmost Safety.

I am at prefent butily occupied in fending the heavy Artillery, Stores, Sick, &c. &c. down the Ghauts, in order to enable me to evacuate the Forts that are to be reftored to Tippoo; and although I shall now have it almost daily in my Power to difcharge fome of the Public Servants and Buliocks, I fnall not be able to reduce the Departments completely to the Peace Eftablishment, until the Arrival of the Troops at the Cantonments that will be allotted for them in our own Territories: But it must give you very great Satisfaction to hear that there neither is at prefent, nor will be at their Arrival in Quarters, One fingle Rupee of Arrears due to the Troops, or to any of the Public Departments, and that the Accounts of all Defcriptions of Military Expenditure are fo closely brought up, that I can at prefent see no good Reason to prevent the Three Prefidencies from making up, in the Courfe of the next Six Months at farthelt, diffinct Statements of the Whole of the extraordinary Expences that have been incurred by the War.

A fmall extra Expence muft be continued to fome of the Bombay Troops that will be obliged to remain in Huts, to be made by themfelves, during the next Rains, on the Coaft of Malabar; and the Bengal Native Troops muft alfo draw Field Allowances until they return to their Cantonments in Bengal, which cannot happen before January next; but both thefe Articles may be effimated with fufficient Correctnefs to be introduced in the general Statements of extraordinary Expence.

Perferam Bhow, with the Corps under his immediate Command, proceeded directly from Seringapatam towards his own Country, and Hurry Punt, and the Nizam's Son and Minister, will feparate from this Army in a few Days. General Abercromby commenced his March to the Coaff of Malabar on the 26th Ultimo, and was, on the fame Day, joined by Captain Little's Detachment, which had only been engaged to ferve with the Maratta Army during the War.

P.S. Since the above Letter was written, Captain Reynolds has, to my great Satisfaction, been able to finish the Sketch, that accompanies this Dispatch, of the Whole of the Countries that have been ceded by Tippoo to the Allies respectively, excepting the District of Soondoon, which belongs to the Portion that fell to the Marattas, but of the Extent and Position of which it has not been in his Power to obtain precise Information.

Tippoo's Country having been divided accordingto its Revenue and nct its Extent, it will be obvious to you that the Nizam and the Marattas could not, in the highly cultivated and fertile Countries in which their Portions were claimed, receive the fame Number

of

of fquare Miles that fell to the Company, as in our Portion the Coorga Country is included, which pays only a small and limited Tribute; and there are confiderable Tracts of hilly and barren Ground in feveral of our other Diffricts; and, for fimilar Reafons, the Division left to Tippoo greatly exceeds, in the Number of fquare Miles, the Whole of that which was ceded to the Allics; as the rugged and unproductive Countries of Myfore and Chittledroog conftitute the principal Portion of the Dominions that remain in his Possession.

HONORABLE SIRS,

LAVING observed, fince the Arrival of the Not-tingham, that a Letter of mine to Sir Charles Oakeley has been published, in which I mention to him, that, in Addition to the Money that would be required to fuzzly our own Wants, I should have Occasion for Twelve Lacks of Rupees to lend to the Marattas; and having fome Doubts whether the odicial Papers that will be transmitted to you this Seafon from Bombay will clearly explain the Nature of that Loan, I have thought that it may be fatiffactory to you to know, by this Opportunity, that it was merely an Advance of fo much Money, to be repaid by the Pefhwa.

When Hurry Punt and Perferam Bhow confented to keep the Field during the Rains, and to affift me in fupporting our Communications and in maintain-ing Possefilion of a large Tract of the Enemy's Country, they stated to me their Apprehensions, that, on Account of the great Diffance from Poona, they might, unlefs affifted, fuffer great Diffuels from Want of Money to pay their Troops; and, in order to obviate all Difficulties on their Part, I readily promifed to furnish the above mentioned Twelve Lacks, for Bills to be drawn by Hurry Punt upon the Pefawa, at the current Rate of Exchange between Madras and Bombay, and made payable to the Bombay Government at Bombay.

The Money was accordingly advanced to Hurry Punt at different Times, in the Course of a few Months after the Arrival of the Confederate Armies in the Neighbourhood of Bangalore; and Bills upon the Peshwa were regularly granted for each Payment at the Rate of Exchange which was declared at Madras to be then current between the Two Places.

I could, without Unfairness, have made additional Charges against them for the Expence of transporting the Money from Madras to the Army, and for Interest during the Time that it was upon the Road ; but it appeared to me that those Articles were of too triffing a Nature to be introduced in a Transaction between Two States; and, whi ft it was perfectly fuitable to us to make a Remittance to Bornbay through that Channel, I had the Pleafere, at an infignificant Expence to the Company, to lay the Marattas under what shey confidered to be a very great Obligation.

Extract of a Letter from the Gowernor and Council of Fort St. George, in their Political Department, to the Court of Directors, dated May 25, 1792.

W E have the Pleafure to inform your Honorable Court, that all the Forts ceded to the Company by the late Definitive Treaty of Peace with Tippoo Sultaun, in the Baramhaul and Salem Countries, have been delivered up, and that we have fent Instructions to Major Cuppage (at the Defire of Lord Convallis) to return to the Carnatic, with the prefent Garrifon of Palicautcherry, as foon as the Troops fent by General Abercromby to take Poffefion of the Fort, shall arrive at that Place. Orders have been fince given by his Lordship for breaking up the Detachment.

At the Recommendation of Lord Cornwallis we have iffued a Proclamation regarding the Renewal of a Commercial Intercourfe between the Carnatic and Myfore Countries; and directing that Merchants of all Descriptions belonging to the Mysore Country be henceforward permitted to enter the Carnatic, and to carry on their Dealings with this Settlement, or with any Part of the Territory of the Company or their Allies, under the fame Privileges which they enjoyed before the late War.

That your Majefty may long reign the happy Sovereign of a free and loyal Pcople, the Guardian of the Laws, the Protector of our Holy Religion, and the Father of our Country, is our earnest Prayer to that Supreme Being, by whom Kings reign, and Princes decree Justice.
