

Whitehall, November 13, 1792.

**W**hereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that between the Hours of Ten and Eleven in the Night of the 1st Instant, a Stack of Tick Beans, a Stack of Clover Seed, and a large Stack of Barley and Oats, standing in the Yards in the Occupation of Hatcher Nunn Pretzman, of Brockdish, in the County of Norfolk, Gentleman, and his Property; and also a Barn full of untreshed Oats, in the same Place, belonging to John Shearing, of Brockdish aforesaid, Farmer, were wilfully and maliciously set on Fire by some Person or Persons unknown, by which the same were wholly consumed.

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in setting Fire to the Property and Effects abovementioned, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them, (except the Person who actually set Fire thereto) who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices therein, so that he, she or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And the Commissioners do hereby also give Notice to the said several Dealers, that it is expected and required that none of these Articles shall be sold, without the proper Stamps being previously PASTED OR AFFIXED thereto, as the Law directs; and that effectual Measures will be taken to detect and prosecute all such Persons as shall, after this Caution, defraud the Public Revenue herein.

IRISH STATE LOTTERY.

Stamp-Office, Somerset-Place, November 10, 1792.

**H**IS Majesty's Commissioners for managing the Stamp Duties think it necessary, on the approaching Drawing of the Irish Lottery, to give this Publick Notice, that the utmost Exertions will be made by this Office for the carrying into full Effect the several Provisions of the Lottery-Regulation, and the Lottery-Vagrant Acts, against all Persons who, in Violation of those Laws, attempt to transact ILLEGAL INSURANCES, either in LICENSED or UNLICENSED OFFICES, or in PUBLIC HOUSES OF ANY DESCRIPTION WHATSOEVER: And further, that having at length put a total End to every Species of that pernicious Practice which so long prevailed by the SALE OF CHANCES; and therefore being the better enabled to prepare and arrange a Plan for crushing at once and generally the only remaining Abuse that has attached on the State Lotteries, the same was submitted to the Consideration of the Lord Mayor and Aldermen of London, and of the Chairman and Justices for Middlesex and Westminster, and for the several Districts under the new Police Act, by whom it has been unanimously determined to co-operate in Support of the Measures prepared by this Office, and to give their utmost Assistance in the speedy and total Suppression of the Abuse, and in the active and effectual Maintenance of the remedial Laws provided for that Purpose.
