A T the Court at St. James's, the 9th of November, 1792,

Έ S E N T. IS Majefty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hath thought for The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. Council, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no Perfon or Perfons whatever shall, from and after the Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, until the 1st Day of March, 1703, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry or convey, or caufe or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed, out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or load or lay on Board, or caufe or procure to be loaded or laid on Board of any Ship, Veffel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Wheat or Wheat Flour .- His Majesty nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, and doth hereby order, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be conftrued to extend, to prohibit the Exportation of any Foreign Wheat or Wheat Flour, which shall have been imported into this Kingdom, and warehoufed in the Manner and upon the Conditions mentioned in an Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, " An Act for regu-" lating the Importation and Exportation of Corn," er and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn " imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn ex-" ported ;" nor to prohibit the carrying Coastwife, or the carrying out and exporting of Wheat and Wheat Flour, in the Manner and in the fame Pro-

pertions and Quantities, and from and to the fame Ports and Places, as is by the faid Act allowed, at fuch Times as Wheat and Wheat Flour are prohibited to be exported, by reafon of the Price of Wheat and Wheat Flour being at or above the Prices mentioned in Table B. in the faid Act contained, fubject to the like Securities, Conditions, Regulations and Reftrictions, Forfeitures and Penalties, as are required and imposed by the faid Act, or by any other Act now in Force, in any of the Cafes aforefaid. —And the Right Honorable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Treafury are to give the neceffary Directions herein accordingly.

As feveral Artificers and Manufacturers, Subjects of Great Britain, bave, from Time to Time, gone inte Foreign Countries to exercise their several Callings, contrary to the Laws of these Kingdoms; the following Abstracts of Acts of Parliament of Their late Majestics King George the First and Second, and of His present Mujesty, for preventing such Prastices, are published, for the Information of all Persons who may be ignorant of the Penaltics they may incur by Disobedience to them: And it will be otherwed, that such Penalties likewijs extend to these such are any ways concerned or instrumental in the Seuding, or Enticing Artificers or Manufacturers out of these Kingdoms, or in the Exportation of the Tools and Instruments used by them, as well as to the Artificers or Manufacturers themselves.

Statute 5 George I. Chap. 27. IF any Perfon shall contract with, entice, or folicit, any Artificer in Wool, Iron, Steel, Brafs, or other Metal, Clock-maker, Watch-maker, or any other
