A PROCLAMATION.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of Our Reign, intituled, "An Act for amending and reducing into One Act of Parliament the Laws relating to the Militia in that Part of Great Britain called England," it is enacted, That it shall be lawful for Us, in the Cases and in Manner therein mentioned, the Occasion being first declared in Council and notified by Proclamation, if no Parliament shall be then sitting, to order and direct the Drawing out and Embodying of Our Militia Forces, or any Part thereof: And whereas We have received Information, that in Breach of the Laws, and notwithstanding Our Royal Proclamation of the Twenty-first Day of May last, the utmost Industry is still employed by evil-disposed Persons within this Kingdom, acting in Concert with Persons in Foreign Parts, with a View to subvert the Laws and established Constitution of this Realm, and to destroy all Order and Government therein; and that a Spirit of Tumult and Disorder, thereby excited, has lately shewn itself in Acts of Riot and Insurrection. And whereas, under the present Circumstances, it is more particularly necessary, that, for the immediate Suppression of such Attempts, some Addition should be made, as the Exigency of the Case may require, to the Force which may be in Readiness to act for the

Support of the Civil Magistrate; We therefore, being determined to exert the Powers vested in Us by Law for the Protection of the Persons, Liberties and Properties of Our faithful Subjects, and fully relying on their Zeal and Attachment to Our Person and Government, and to the happy Constitution established in these Kingdoms, have thought fit to declare in Our Council Our Royal Intention, for the Causes and on the Occasion aforesaid, to draw out and embody such Part of Our Militia Forces as may more immediately enable Us to provide for the said important Objects. And We do hereby, in pursuance of the said recited Act, notify to all Our loving Subjects Our said Intention, and the Causes and Occasion thereof.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Twenty-sixth Year of Our Reign, intituled, "An Act for amending and reducing into One Act of Parliament the Laws relating to the Militia in that Part of Great Britain called England," it is enacted, That

That whenever We shall cause the Militia to be drawn out and embodied, on the Occasions and in the Manner therein mentioned, if the Parliament shall then be separated by such Adjournment or Prorogation as will not expire within Fourteen Days, We may and shall issue Our Proclamation for the Meeting of the Parliament within Fourteen Days; and the Parliament shall accordingly meet and sit upon such Day as shall be appointed by such Proclamation, and continue to sit and act in like Manner, to all Intents and Purposes, as if it had stood adjourned or prorogued to the same Day: And whereas We have thought fit, in pursuance of the said Act, this Day to declare in Our Council, certain Causes and Occasions moving Us to order and direct, that such Part of Our Militia Forces, as may more immediately enable Us to provide for the important Objects therein mentioned, should be drawn out and embodied: And whereas, in pursuance of the said recited Act, We have thought fit on this Day to issue Our Royal Proclamation, notifying the Causes and Occasions so declared in Council as aforesaid: And whereas Our Parliament now stands prorogued to Thursday the Third Day of January next; We therefore, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare Our Royal Will and Pleasure, That Our said Parliament shall, on Thursday the Thirteenth Day of this instant December, be held for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs. And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give Attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said Thirteenth Day of December.

A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

For encouraging Seamen and Landmen to enter themselves on Board His Majesty's Ships of War.

G E O R G E R.

WHEREAS it is Our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen and Landmen who shall voluntarily enter themselves in Our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to publish this Our Royal Proclamation: And We do hereby promise and declare, That all such Able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for Our Service, who shall, on or before the Thirty-first Day of this instant December, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in Our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of Our Ships or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of Our Navy, shall receive, as Our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Three Pounds each Man; and all such Ordinary Seamen, fit for Our Service, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Two Pounds each Man; and all such Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who shall so enter themselves as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man, as Our Royal Bounty; such respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Checque residing at the Ports where the Ships or Vessels, on Board which such Seamen and Landmen may be appointed to serve, shall be, immediately after the Third Muster of such Seamen and Landmen: And We do declare, That the Qualifications of the Seamen and Landmen, so entering themselves, shall be certified by the Captain, Master and Boatswain of the Ship or Vessel on Board which they shall be appointed to serve. And for Prevention of any Abuses by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on Board any other Our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty Money, We do hereby declare and command, That such Seamen and Landmen belonging to any of Our Ships or Vessels;

Vessels, as shall absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on Board any other of Our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be punished according to their Demerits.

HIS Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hath thought fit to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no Person or Persons whatever shall, from and after the Publication of this Order in the London Gazette, until the 1st Day of March, 1793, directly or indirectly, export, transport, carry or convey, or cause or procure to be exported, transported, carried or conveyed, out of or from any Port or Place in Great Britain, or load or lay on Board, or cause or procure to be loaded or laid on Board of any Ship, Vessel or Boat, in order to be exported or carried out of any Port or Place in Great Britain, any Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made of Barley, Beer or Bigg: His Majesty nevertheless, by the Advice aforesaid, hath thought fit to order, and doth hereby order, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to prohibit the Exportation of any Foreign Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made of Barley, Beer or Bigg, which shall have been imported into this Kingdom, and warehoused in the Manner and upon the Conditions mentioned in an Act passed in the Thirty-first Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for regulating the Importation and Exportation of Corn, and the Payment of the Duty on Foreign Corn imported, and of the Bounty on British Corn exported;" nor to prohibit the carrying Coastwise, or the carrying out and exporting of Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made of Barley, Beer or Bigg, in the Manner and in the same Proportions and Quantities, and from and to the same Ports and Places, as is by the said Act allowed, at such Times as Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made of Barley, Beer or Bigg, are prohibited to be

exported, by Reason of the Price of Barley, Beer or Bigg, or Meal, Flour, Malt, Bread or Biscuit made of Barley, Beer or Bigg, being at or above the Prices mentioned in Table B. in the said Act contained, subject to the like Securities, Conditions, Regulations and Restrictions, Forfeitures and Penalties as are required and imposed by the said Act, or by any other Act now in Force, in any of the Cases aforesaid: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

Whereas an Act of Parliament was passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of the Reign of His late Majesty King George the Second, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms and Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:" And His Majesty, judging it necessary to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder or Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, out of this Kingdom, or carrying the same Coastwise, for some Time, doth, therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever (except the Master-General of the Ordnance, for His Majesty's Service) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months from the Date of this Order in Council, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, on Board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty, or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by the aforementioned Act: And the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain,
