THEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the First Day of this instant December, to promife and declare, that a Bounty of Three Pounds should be paid to every Able Seaman, and of Two Pounds to every Ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for His Majesty's Service; and a Bounty of Twenty Shillings to all such Able-bodied Landmen, not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should, on or before the Thirty-first Day of this instant December, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of His Majesty's Navy: And whereas the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties is near expiring; and it being judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, that the faid Bounties should commue to be paid for fome Time longer, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby ordered, that the Time limited for Payment of the faid Bounties be prolonged and extended from the faid Thirty-first Day of this instant December, to the Twenty-eighth Day of February next, inclufive: Whereof all Perfons concerned are to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.
